MURDERERS LEAVE THUMB-PRINT CLUE

New York, March 15.—A thumb print alongside the names of two men written on the register may prove a clue to the identity of the murderer of Isadore Valanto, night clerk of a hotel in Whitehall street, whose body was found in a small room adjoining the office this morning. Valanto's skull had been fractured and his throat cut. The murderers rifled Valanto's pockets, took \$75 from the hotel till and made an unsuccessful effort to open the safe, in which there was \$3,000. There is no clue except the thumb prints.

LAW IS UPHELD.

New Orleans, March 15.—In a unanimous opinion the state supreme court today upheld the constitutionality of the Locke law prohibiting gambling on race tracks and approved the sentence of several months' imprisonment and \$300 fine imposed on Robert Sheffield and Placide Frigerio, who served as bookmakers at the City Park race track.

SEEKING WITNESSES AGAINST SWINDLERS

St. Louis, March 15.—Postoffice Inspector Swenson today mailed 40 circular letters to various victims of the swindling operations of J. C. Maybray and his assistants, asking the recipients to testify before the federal grand jury in Council Bluffs, Iowa, when the case is to be considered. Swenson received a letter today from Frank H. Pilling of Tacoma, Wash., saying that he was swindled out of \$18,000 in a "fake" prizefight last August. When he complained to the authorities he was arrested and sentenced to a year's imprisonment for aiding and abetting the fraud. He has appealed from that judgment and is going to testify against Maybray.

SCHLITZ ON TRIAL.

Helena, March 15.—John Schlitz was placed on trial in the federal court today on the charge of holding Martha Swain, an alien woman, for immoral purposes. Schlitz fled from Havre with the girl when the immigration authorities began investigating the case, but he was captured in Idaho. The girl's mother is now a prisoner in the county jail here and will be tried when the Schlitz case is disposed of on the charge of importing her for immoral purposes.

FINES STANDARD OIL TWENTY THOUSAND

Buffalo, N. Y., March 15.—Federal Judge Hazel today denied the motion of the Standard Oil company for a new trial and imposed a fine of \$20,000. The case hinged on the Standard's accepting concessions from railroads on shipments of oil from Olean, N. Y., to points in Vermont.

WILL MAKE GUN-COTTON.

Mexico City, March 15.—The Krupps of Germany will at once begin the manufacture of gun-cotton in this republic. The Mexican government has located 14 buildings for the use of the Krupps. These buildings are located on the outskirts of Santa Fe, a suburb of this city.

STARTS ON LONG WALK.

New York, March 15.—Edward Payson Weston, the veteran pedestrian, started from the New York office at 4:20 p. m. today on his 4,200-mile walk to San Francisco. A crowd of several thousand persons cheered him as he stepped off Park row, with a band, mounted police and a detachment from the Seventh regiment in attendance.

NO DECISION RENDERED.

Washington, March 15.—Contrary to expectations, the supreme court did not render its decision in the case involving the constitutionality of the commodities clause of the Hepburn rate law of 1906.

BIG MILL RESUMES OPERATIONS BRYAN HAS HIS EYE ON SENATE

ANACONDA COPPER MINING COMPANY'S PLANT AT HAMILTON IS WORKING AGAIN.

Special to The Daily Missoulian. Hamilton, March 15.—The sawmill of the Anaconda Copper Mining Company commenced operations this morning at 7 o'clock. Its shrill whistle sounded morning, noon and night, which, in addition to the other whistles of the town, gave Hamilton a metropolitan tone. This is the first time a wheel has turned since June 30 of last year, that being the day the strike of the loggers put the mill out of commission and 500 men temporarily out of work. The strike was caused by the lumbermen refusing to accept the scale in effect prior to May 1, 1907.

The saloon men of Hamilton are circulating a petition remonstrating against the ordinance that the Moral Improvement society is asking the city council to pass. It will be presented tomorrow evening along with the ordinance asking that the hours in which saloons can do business be regulated. The fishermen were in evidence yesterday. It was an ideal day for an outing and many rods and poles hung out over the water in the Bitter Root river. Several nice catches were reported last night, and from now on there will be an exodus from town every Sunday.

MANY COLONISTS EN ROUTE.

Ogden, Utah, March 15.—Rio Grande passenger trains from the east brought in 233 colonist passengers for different points in Idaho, Washington and Oregon, and these went north over the Oregon Short Line, while colonists arriving over the Union Pacific this morning numbered 110 and were sent to California over the Southern Pacific. Local railroad officials have instructions to prepare for a great rush of homeseekers near the end of the month.

NINE PERSONS INJURED.

St. Joseph, Mo., March 15.—Nine persons were injured as a result of the wrecking of a tenement house here last night by an explosion of natural gas. All except one are Italians. Salvatore Balsano and Thomas J. Salsano die. Mrs. Firo threw her two small children from a second story window and jumped herself.

MILITARY ACTIVITY BECOMING ALARMING

Washington, March 15.—Extraordinary military activity in Nicaragua prevails, according to dispatches received at the state department today from Mr. Gregory, the departing secretary. According to his advices about 6,000 Nicaraguan troops are now near the Honduran frontier. The chief scene of activity is in the neighborhood of Corinto, where also are concentrated four gunboats and other auxiliary craft. It is manifest that Zelaya's doings are beginning to cause considerable feeling against him.

Chicago, March 15.—William J. Bryan, in an interview here today, impressed his auditors with the idea that he will be a receptive, if not an active candidate for the United States senate from Nebraska, in 1911, to succeed Elmer J. Burkett, republican. "Nebraska has adopted the Oregon plan of popular elections," said Mr. Bryan. "I do not know yet whether I will be a candidate. A senatorship I aspired to even when a boy. If there seems to be a good chance to elect to the senate from Nebraska some other democrat it will please me better than to be a candidate myself. I think the democratic party is in better condition than at any time since 1892 and that it has an excellent chance to control congress in 1910."




