ANGRY SPOUSE SHOT BY HUSBAND

TO PROTECT HIMSELF, SAND-POINT SALOONKEEPER WOUNDS HIS WIFE.

Sandpoint, March 21.—A shooting affray occurred at an early hour this morning at Westwood, near here, as the result of an altercation between Alex Enos, a saloonkeeper of that place, and his wife. Enos shot her at a dance held in the hall a short distance from the saloon, and while Enos was dancing with his wife she flew into a passion over some fancied injury and left the floor. A bystander stepped to the floor and rushed the dance in place of the woman, after which Enos went to the saloon in search of his wife. Arriving there he found her in the bar room with a revolver in her hands. Enos stepped back of the bar, at which time the woman said, "I'll kill you right here." There being no gun behind the bar Enos dared the woman to shoot. He said, "You can't shoot too quick," at which remark she lowered her gun and it was taken from her. Later she secured another revolver and walking toward the bar, raised her hand to fire, at which time Enos shot her through the arm to disable her. At this she came to her senses and told Enos that she was sorry for what she had done and that he had served her right. The cause of the shooting is thought to have been jealousy, but the woman had been drinking at the time.

Among the more important changes of this kind may be mentioned electric apparatus of various kinds and refrigerators, etc., the reductions ranging from 20 to 40 per cent, according to weight. Among the changes affecting both the general and the minimum rates, the following are the most important: Hams, present general rate 50 francs, proposed 30; minimum 20; cotton seed oil, present general rate 6 francs, proposed 25; minimum 4; pig iron, proposed increase in general rates of 50 per cent and over, increase in minimum rates of 33 per cent and over; iron and steel ingots, blooms, bars and billets, increases under the general tariff ranging from 25 per cent to 800 per cent and in the minimum tariff up to 500 per cent and


