BABY IS DISCOVERED ON DOORSTEP

CORONER KENDRICK FINDS TINY GIRL AT DOOR OF SISTERS' HOSPITAL.

Shivering in the cold, crying and sucking hungrily at a rubber comforter, a tiny baby girl that had been abandoned by its parents was found last night on the doorstep of the Sisters' hospital by Coroner Kendrick.

The coroner gathered the little bundle of humanity in his arms and, after debating whether to take it home or turn it over to the sisters of the hospital, finally decided upon the latter course and the deserted youngster is being given every care possible by its new friends.

Mr. Kendrick was returning to his office shortly after dark, and on his way passed by the north side of the hospital.

"I heard cries that sounded as if they came from a baby," said the coroner in describing his experience, "and for a minute or two could not locate their source. Finally I saw a bundle of what looked like blankets lying on the doorstep of the hospital.

When I got to the bundle I saw it move and the next moment I discovered that in the center of the blanket was a real live baby. The poor little thing was almost frozen and I took it into the hospital as quickly as possible. I was of half a mind to take it home, but I feared that longer exposure to the wind might harm it.

An examination of the child's clothing and the blanket showed that while they were not fancy, they were of good material but held no clue that might tell who the parents are that abandoned the little girl to the mercy of the elements. Mr. Kendrick reported the matter to the sheriff and an entreaty of the parents. The baby is but three or four days old.
