SOUTH SIDE DEPARTMENT ANSWERS THREE ALARMS

The south side fire department was called out three times yesterday to attend to small blazes, the most important one being at the Roosevelt school at a few minutes before 3 o'clock in the afternoon, when out-roof ablaze. A spectator, who held a watch at the time, states that just an even minute was required for the big building to be emptied of its 300 small children. The blaze was extinguished with little damage to the building. It is thought that falling sparks from the chimney caused the roof to be set afire. The smaller blaze, at the Hoover cleaning parlors, was at noon and was put out by people in the place, just before the arrival of the department. It was caused by exploding gasoline. The third alarm was turned in from the 200 block on South Sixth street, west, at 7:50 last evening. The cause was a too-enthusiastic bonfire.

PUNISHMENT IS LEFT TO COURT

JURY FINDS S. B. PROTINE OF SALTESE GUILTY OF ASSAULT IN THIRD DEGREE.

S. B. Protine was last evening found guilty of assault in the third degree by a jury in the district court. His trial was resumed yesterday morning and at 2 o'clock the case was given to the jury. Protine was charged with having beaten John Bean, a Butte attorney, at Saltese on February 1. He claimed that he whipped Bean in retaliation for an insult to Mrs. Gust Moser, the wife of his employer. John Bean and James Hillier testified for the state, while the defense introduced the defendant, Mrs. Moser and her 6-year-old son, Samuel Protine, and Dennis O'Leary.

Left to Court. Protine's punishment was left to the court. A person convicted of assault in the third degree may be fined \$500, sent to jail for six months, or be subjected to both fine and imprisonment.

Start of New Case. Yesterday afternoon a start was made on the case of the state against O. F. Rathiff, who is charged with assault on Peter Erickson. Eight jurors were secured yesterday and this morning the trial is to be resumed. According to the story told last evening by the defendant, today's testimony promises to be rather interesting. Rathiff, who is known in Saltese as "Daddy," is 70 years old and of a benevolent appearance, with long, white whiskers. The defendant says that he was protecting a friend from being robbed, and that he discharged his pistol through the ceiling simply to protect himself.
