GEOGRAPHER WANTS IRRIGATION DISCUSSED

Spokane, Wash., March 27.—Thomas G. Gardine, geographer of the topographical branch of the United States geological survey, stationed at Sacramento, Cal., suggests in a letter to R. Insinger, chairman of the local board of control, that the subject of the utilization of water for generating power incidental to irrigation, drainage and deep waterway development be fully discussed at the 17th sessions of the National Irrigation congress in Spokane the second week in August.

'This is one of the important, if not the most important problems in the future development of the northwest, part of our country,' Mr. Gardine adds, 'and its close relation with irrigation, forestry and deep waterways demand that it shall be given careful attention and exposition at this time.'
