

INJUNCTION ACTION CRITICIZED

RAILROAD ATTORNEY SAYS MISSOURI'S SUIT IS BASED ON UNSOUND LAW.

Kansas City, Mo., April 9.—Frank Hagerman, leading attorney for the 18 railroads entering Missouri, in a statement made here today declared that the state's injunction suit filed yesterday to prevent the railroads from returning to the three-cent fare was unsound law. "Governor Hadley's St. Louis suit," said Mr. Hagerman today, "seems to be based upon two grounds, both of which are unsound: "1. The railroads by making the new rate have violated the anti-trust statute. "2. The issue of mileage books is a discrimination. "The anti-trust statute has no application to railroad rates, but by its terms only prohibits combinations in the sale of commodities and insurance. There is no discrimination because the mileage books are sold

to all alike. Anyhow, the public, not the railroads, would be hurt by an injunction against their use for since the two-cent fare law was enjoined the old law is in force and this authorizes three cents. Anything less is a matter of grace from the railroads."

May Ask Congress. Jefferson City, Mo., April 9.—That congress will be asked to direct an investigation of the Missouri rate situation by the interstate commerce commission, and that the circuit attorneys throughout the state should institute suits similar to that filed in St. Louis last night, asking for an injunction against the announced increase in passenger fares, were indicated by Governor Hadley today in a discussion of the latest steps taken by the state to avoid the enforcement of the new schedules. The governor also said he had presented the matter to the state warehouse and railroad commissioners.

RECORDS DISCLOSE QUEER THINGS

MANY IMPROPER ASSIGNMENTS OF GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES ARE MADE, IT IS SAID.

Washington, April 9.—"The records of the civil service commission and of the several departments in Washington disclose the assignment of a vast number of government employees to various states in which as a matter of fact they never resided," said Senator LaFollette today. He is chairman of the committee on census, which reported an amendment to the census bill requiring applicants for positions within the general classified service of the government to take their examinations in the states to which they are accredited as legal residents.

"It was to correct this abuse of the civil service law which requires an apportionment of employees of the civil service among the several states and territories that this amendment was adopted," said the senator. "Many people come to Washington,

Mr. Davidson denies he entered into any sort of marriage contract with Miss Clark.

Miss Clark has published letters received while she was at the Grand hotel, Cincinnati, addressed to Mrs. E. E. Davidson, in which she is addressed in endearing terms by the writer. These letters, it is alleged, are in the handwriting of Mr. Davidson.

MANY LETTERS REACH THE WHITLAS

SOME OF THEM MAKE DEMANDS FOR MONEY AND CONTAIN DIRE THREATS.

Sharon, Pa., April 9.—Mrs. James H. Boyle, one of the alleged abductors of Willie Whittle, will be brought from the Mercer county jail to this city for a hearing early next week. This will permit the return of Mrs. Boyle to Mercer in time for the meeting of the grand jury there on April 19.

Since little Willie Whittle was kidnapped on March 18 more than 4,000 pieces of mail have been received addressed to the boy and his father, Mr. Whittle granted the Associated Press permission to examine the mail today. Post cards predominated, Willie having received 2,900 cards from boys in all parts of the United States, Canada, Mexico and quite a number from Europe. All the writers express their pleasure that Willie was returned safe and sound to his parents.

Letters to Mr. Whittle request donations of money for various purposes.

One woman in a western city desiring to secure a divorce, asks for money to start proceedings against her husband.

Quite a number of the letters are of a threatening nature, demanding anywhere from \$1,000 to \$10,000, stating that in the event the money is refused Mr. Whittle and his family will be blown up by dynamite.
