

### HARRIMAN HILL FEUD A MYTH

PRESIDENT OF GREAT NORTHERN DENIES THAT THERE'S ANY FIGHT BETWEEN ROADS.

St. Paul, April 13.—Louis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern railroad, returned today from a visit to the Pacific coast. He said that the last remaining difficulty between the Harriman and Hill interests on the coast had been settled by an agreement between himself and E. H. Harriman, by which the Hill road would secure a part ownership in the terminal at Portland, and go in there as a bedfellow with the Harriman interests. Incidentally he declared that the Harriman-Hill feud, so-called, was remarkable only for its non-existence.

"There never was any Harriman-Hill feud," he said. "That was a newspaper dream. Certainly there has been and will continue to be a sharp competition. That's true of every business. There have been business contentions between the Harriman and Hill interests; that's natural enough, isn't it, considering the immense amount of capital invested and the territory covered and the business handled?"

"My meeting with Mr. Harriman," he continued, "was misrepresented by the San Francisco papers so flagrantly that I felt called upon to deny the story they printed through the Associated Press. They had us waiting to join issues and split up territory, which, in the first place, would be criminal."

"It would be conspiracy, wouldn't it?" "Looked like it to me. The true situation was that we wanted to get to Portland and made all necessary purchases to put up an independent station for our terminal. But the Portland people did not want another station; they wanted a Union station. We are willing to go in, but not as a Harriman tenant. We wanted to own an interest in the terminal. On the coast Mr. Harriman, and I talked it over, and decided to settle it on the spot."

"In 20 minutes I had a proposition which satisfied him and he took it back with him to submit to the directors. So the last obstruction has been removed."

"What about the much talked of fight of the Hill interests to keep Harriman out of Seattle?" "All nonsense. Two years ago we cut off a strip of our property and sold it to Harriman to let him into Seattle, and did it so quietly there was hardly a ripple. The transfer was made without anyone knowing it."

### WOULD DEMONSTRATE FEASIBILITY OF PLAN

Washington, April 13.—"To urge" upon the navy department the importance of allowing the larger ships of the navy to pass up the Mississippi river so as to demonstrate to the nations of the world the feasibility of using the great waterway as an avenue of commerce, the delegation of members of the United States senate and house from the states of Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas and Tennessee will call to see Secretary Meyer tomorrow or the following day.

### PLANNING TO SAVE THE HICKORY

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OPENS FIRST MEETING IN CINCINNATI, OHIO.

Cincinnati, O., April 13.—The National Hickory association opened its first annual meeting here today. The object is to devise a plan of co-operation between the users of hickory wood and the national government to insure a future supply of the wood. The visible supply, it was said, will last but 15 years, and 30 years are required to grow a new hickory tree. Consumers say that if the government will sell them the hickory on the forest reserves and then plant a new tree for every one felled the future will take care of itself.

C. H. Burns, of Chicago, the attorney for the association said: "The demand for hardwoods, especially for hickory, is growing by leaps and bounds, chiefly by reason of the demands of the lumber trade and the supply is virtually at a standstill. Most of the hickory now being used in the carriage and automobile trade comes from Tennessee and Arkansas and from the western states."

Edinburgh, April 13.—The recent factional brawls in the ranks of the independent labor party which have militated seriously against the usefulness of the party in the house of commons, came to a climax at today's session of the annual congress of the organization when James Kier Hardie, Philip Snowden, Ramsey MacDonald and Bruce Glasier resigned their seats as members of the national administrative council. The immediate cause of the trouble was the adoption by the congress of what amounted to a vote of confidence in Victor Grayson, between whom and Mr. Hardie there had been a feud of long standing. The resignations made a sensation in the congress. Efforts were made to secure their withdrawal but they stuck to their determination. Should this split in the labor party continue it will relieve the federal government of much pressure in the direction of socialistic legislation.

Pittsburg, April 13.—In a riot at Manitow, a mining town, early today, six foreigners were seriously injured, two of them fatally. Daggers and knives were used. The six men injured were suitors for the hand of Lizzie Mozek, the belle of the settlement. The father, to help the lovers, proposed drawing lots to decide the question. A foreigner named Chenzo won but a free for all fight started.

Washington, April 13.—Declaring that they would return to Japan bearing the good wishes of President Taft and government officials here and assured of this government's support in making the Tokio exposition a success, Director General Hikajiri Wada and Commissioner Taketuro Sakio of Japan, today left for Chicago. They will visit western cities in the interest of the exposition before sailing for Japan.

Winipeg, Man., April 13.—Last night was one of the coldest of the season. At Prince Albert it was 14 below zero; at Regina 11 below; at Qu'Appelle zero and at Battleford 4 above. It snowed heavily at Edmonton, Calgary and Lethbridge. The lowest temperature was 12 above.

Many Will Exhibit Dry Farms Produce. Denver, Col., April 13.—The next session of the dry farming congress will be held at Billings, Mont., some time during the fall of this year. The date was not determined at the recent convention at Cheyenne, but will be selected during the autumn months in order to enable the farmers to take to the congress exhibits of their crops that will show to better advantage what has been done by dry farmers than is possible when the congress meets many months after the harvest. Secretary-Treasurer John T. Burns has taken up the matter of an international exposition of dry farm products with the governments of a number of foreign countries and has received assurances from Brazil, Mexico, Australia and other lands that they will send exhibits to Billings. The people of Billings are taking an active interest in the movement and promise that the coming congress and its exposition shall be one of the greatest in the history of dry farming.

Canadian Pacific Assumes Control. Milwaukee, Wis., April 13.—The control of the Wisconsin Central railroad was today formally transferred to the Canadian Pacific system. The transfer was made at a special meeting of the Wisconsin Central railroad company's stockholders held here today when the lease of that company's railroad property to the Minneapolis, St. Paul & Sault Ste. Marie and the agreements between the two companies heretofore authorized by their respective boards were ratified and approved by the largest vote ever cast.

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### MARKET MOVEMENTS OF THE DAY

TRANSACTIONS IN SECURITIES RECORDED ON THE NEW YORK STOCK EXCHANGE.

New York, April 13.—There was a wavering tendency in the stock market today which changed its recent semblance of stability. The resumption of activities abroad after the Easter holiday interval was partly responsible for this, the selling of stocks here for foreign account, arguing some distrust of this market's rate of advance. An element in the home speculation that feels the same distrust is not lacking and its activities were joined to the depressing influence from abroad to affect the market. The plethora of condition of the money market is alleged to be solely responsible for the freedom with which speculative purchases of stocks are made, and it is pointed out that the speculative activity is common to stocks, wheat and cotton, although causes which raise the price of those articles might be regarded as making against values of railroad stocks.

Some reliance on cheap money to lift the prices of stocks is feared as leading to inflation of values. The other party to the speculation urges that cheap money is an inevitable after effect of the financial crisis of 1907, which is as certain to stimulate renewed employment of capital in business as are the cuts in prices of material to invite renewal of consumptive demand.

While the low money rates are accepted, therefore, as a result of present stagnation of mercantile demand, the change there is claimed as promising betterment, and therefore calling for speculative anticipation. Foreign markets were reported to be unsettled to some extent by the disturbances in Constantinople, and the home market sold stocks in the late dealings on the assumption that there may be less business abroad on that account in the future. It is noted that the sale of municipal bonds during March were larger for that class than any month on record. These evidences of the abundance of capital and the cheapness at which it can be had are calculated to incite a revival of enterprise. Some of the operations for lower prices today came from speculators who had sold their holdings yesterday to meet the new demand from outside sources, and having realized profits in that way hoped to sell lower prices at which to rebuy. The market was not lacking in points of strength, and at times during the day the show of firmness extended generally through the list. A conspicuous feature was Denver & Rio Grande, regarding which rumors circulated of an active interest by E. H. Harriman in its affairs. The Goulds to some who had some benefit by sympathy from this movement. On the other hand other stocks foremost in the recent rise were pressed for sale to take profits, and this radiated a depressing influence through the whole list.

Chicago, April 13.—Sensational advances in the prices of wheat at the principal grain centers of Europe, particularly at Liverpool, where gains of 3 1/2 pence to 3 3/4 pence since last Thursday were recorded, caused the market here to open exciting and strong, with all deliveries selling at record-breaking prices for the season. The initial advances ranged from 1/4c to 1 1/2c, the latter being on May, which opened at \$1.27 to \$1.28. First trades in July were made at \$1.16 1/2 to \$1.16 3/4, and in September at \$1.08 1/2 to \$1.09 1/2. Demand for July was enormous, and that delivery soon shot up to \$1.17 1/2. September rose to \$1.09 1/2. The strength in May was said to have been due to the closing out of trades for the account of a New York firm, which went into the hands of a receiver today. The market closed firm with July at \$1.16 1/2 to \$1.16 3/4 and September at \$1.07 1/2. Corn closed 1/4c to 1/2c lower than yesterday's close; May, 69c. Oats closed weak at 1/4c to 3/4c lower, may being at 53 1/2c. Provisions closed 2 1/2c to 5c higher compared with yesterday's final quotations.
