## MARKET MOVEMENTS OF THE DAY

### TRANSACTIONS IN SECURITIES RECORDED ON THE NEW YORK STOCK EXCHANGE.

New York, April 16.—Speculative interest in stocks flagged today and the tone of the market was heavy in an uncertain way. The depression was not pronounced until the final dealings and had little that was possible to account for. The violent break in wheat yesterday was accepted with some satisfaction in stock circles, and there was a feeling of disappointment when it was seen that wheat was inclined to resume its advances. In connection with the excited speculation in wheat it was regarded as rather ominous that an agitation against it should be started in quarters active in past bearish campaigns in the stock market. The extension of the speculation in wheat has sharpened the sense of the stock market tradition that parallel bull speculations in stocks and grains present an anomaly, the rule being for contrary price movement in the two markets. It was not until the renewed bulge in wheat late in the day that the weakness of stocks developed positive qualities. Prices broke with some violence, making last prices the lowest of the day.

Bonds were irregular. Total sales, par value, \$5,896,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.

### Grain and Provisions.

Chicago, April 16.—The wheat market was an extremely choppy affair during the early part of the session, but during the final hour sentiment crystallized into decided bullishness, brought about chiefly by heavy purchases of the July option. Trade in May was brisk at the outset, leading longs being free sellers. Later, however, this option was neglected in favor of the more deferred futures. Pit sentiment today was created principally by foreign advices. Official

### statistics indicated that the wheat movement this week from Argentina and Australia was at a low ebb, the exports from the former country being 2,344,900 bushels, compared with 3,725,000 the corresponding time a year ago.

This was generally considered a sure indication that weekly statistics next Monday would reveal a marked falling off in the world's movement and in the amount on passage. Sales of cash wheat here were limited. After pursuing an unevenful course compared with the turbulent session of the previous session, the market broke sharply toward the end of the first hour on liberal profit taking in May. The price of that option dropped from \$1.27 1/2 to \$1.25 1/2 in a short space of time, while July sold off more than 1c, declining from \$1.16 1/2 to \$1.15 1/2. Leading bulls promptly came to the support of the July option and the price of that month quickly rallied, but May was less buoyant. The top for July was reached at \$1.17 1/2 and closed at \$1.17, while May finished at \$1.27 1/2. September sold between \$1.06 1/2 and \$1.07 1/2, and closed at \$1.07 1/2.

The feature of the trade in oats was active buying of September delivery based on delay to seeding by wheat weather. That option showed a net gain for the day of 1 3/4c. The market in general was strong all day. The upturn in the price of coarse grain also had a bullish effect and the close was unchanged at 7 1/2c higher.
