LUCY BLOCK READY FOR USE

NEW BUILDING TO BE FINISHED AND OCCUPIED DURING THE NEXT WEEK.

During the past week the builders have put in their best licks and the next week will see at least one of the big business blocks finished and ready for occupation. All of the other blocks are being pushed along at a fast rate, and it will not be many more weeks before practically all of them are finished.

Start Moving In.

The Lucy building is the one on which the best work has been done, and on Friday the firm will start moving its furniture stock into it. The building has been built especially for the owners, and when the moving in is finished it will be one of the most up-to-date and finely equipped stores in this part of the country. The first floor of the block is to be used for the furniture stock and the second for carpets and other like furnishings, while a crockery stock will be put in the basement. In the back part of the store Mr. Lucy is going to install modern undertaking rooms, which will be in charge of W. D. Kendrick.

Other Buildings.

The Lacasse block, or the Savoy hotel, as it is to be called, is also nearly ready, and in a couple of weeks the Lacasse Brothers will turn it over to the lessees, who will at once install their hotel fixtures.

Jack Wilson, who is putting up the Greenhood building, has also been doing speedy work and has finished the foundation of the building. The plans for this block have been drawn by Link & Haile and their perspective,

which shows one of the nicest three-story buildings in the city, has been on exhibition in the Hotel Shapard window for some time.

Over across the river the work on the new Penwell block is progressing at a remarkable pace. The foundation wall has been started and the contractors will begin at once on the building proper. With this big three-story block on the corner of Higgins avenue and Third street, and with the new bridge and the station of the Milwaukee just below it, the end of South Higgins avenue is going to be one of the most attractive streets in the city.

Other blocks and residences too numerous to mention are going up at the same remarkable rate, and if the number of building permits which have been issued during the past few weeks by Inspector May may be taken as any evidence of building to come, the city is going to see the most remarkable building season in its history during the coming summer.

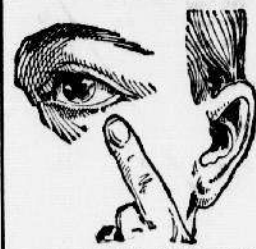
