# CAUGHT ON THE RUN ABOUT TOWN

PEOPLE YOU KNOW AND SOME OF THE THINGS THEY DO AND SAY.

There are a good many Michigan folks in this part of the country, some of them having come from the copper districts and some from the timber belt, attracted to Montana by the opportunities which are offered in their own fields. In Missoula there are lots of these good people and, while there is now and then one of them who goes back, most of them stick. But they have got a soft spot in their hearts for the old state back amongst the lakes and there are many local papers which come from those districts to Missoula every week, telling of the doings of the folks at home. One of these papers—the Grand Haven Courier-Journal—reached here yesterday and an item which appears in it indicates that there will be a lot of transplanted Michiganders here in a few days. They are coming to build a big sawmill—what sawmill is not stated but it is supposed to be one that has been announced for some time as likely to be built at the mouth of the Blackfoot. Here is the advance bulletin of the approach of the millwrights:

"A. M. VanWormer and his party of Grand Haven carpenters and builders expect to leave next week Wednesday for Missoula, Montana, near which place they will begin the construction of a big sawmill. Mr. VanWormer was at work in the same place last year, when the panic struck the country and operations ceased. His crew this year will be made up of some of the best workmen in this city and Spring Lake. Besides Mr. VanWormer the following will make the trip: John Kieft, Arthur Pellegrin, Fred Matker, Fred Jonker, Will Walsh and Bert Van Wormer of this city; Joseph Steinbach, Deles J. Stroobe and Albert Coveny of Spring Lake. Some of the crew will come back to Grand Haven as soon as the work is finished, but others among them are going to see the rest of the far west before they again turn their faces homeward. D. J. Stroobe, who is to be with the party, has gone out with Mr. Van Wormer a number of times before and stated this morning that when it came to looking after the comfort and convenience of the men in his charge, Mr. Van Wormer could be classed among the very best. Besides he has the reputation of being one of the best millwrights in the business."

Yesterday morning the bulletin from the sick room of Pat Donovan was not encouraging; the old fellow had had a bad night and his condition during the forenoon was regarded as unfavorable in the extreme. But in the afternoon there was a decided rally and last night it was said that the chances for his recovery were much improved. This was good news to the friends who have been watching the struggle which the sturdy old man has been making against disease. "I believe Pat will get well now," was the comment of one of his friends last night. "I was permitted to see him for a minute this afternoon and he was certainly better than he was the day before. He has a great constitution and his will is strong. He is putting up a great fight and I think the chances tonight are in his favor."

C. H. McLeod has returned from a visit of a week in Kallispell and the neighboring country. KALISPPELL is LIVELY with the conditions in the Flathead. "Kallispell is lively," said Mr. McLeod yesterday to a Missoulian reporter. "The town is growing fast and the people are working hard for their city. It is a great country that centers in Kallispell and its development has only just begun. There are some magnificent farms up there and the number of them increases each year. I was interested in the work that the chamber of commerce is doing up there; the Kallispell people are well organized for the work of advertising their city and they are overlooking nothing that will contribute to the success of their valley. The north-and-south railway which will be built across the reservation will be a great thing for Kallispell as it will place the town in closer communication with the other cities of western Montana; especially will it promote the business relations between Missoula and Kallispell, which will be a good thing for both towns. This line will be one of the important items in our growth here."

Mayor-elect Logan is back from Great Falls, where he attended the state meeting of the master horsehoers. MAYOR IS HOME to get home again, though he says the convention was the most successful that the association has ever held. Speaking of Great Falls, Mr. Logan said yesterday: "The city is fine; things are going at a lively gallop up there, but I didn't see where they are any busier than we are here. I was interested, of course, in the work that has been done up there under the improvement-district plan; it is remarkable and the city is a model for the others in the state will do well to follow. But their crowds are not as large as ours and Saturday night did not seem to be as lively there as it is here. But it is a great city and when we are connected directly with it by railway, we shall have a mighty good neighbor."

Mr. McGinnis was present at the state convention of the association in Great Falls and accepted the invitation of Andrew Logan to come to Missoula and spend a day or two. # MODEL REFRIGERATOR INSTALLED

KOOPMAN & WISSBROD ARE FITTING THEIR MARKET WITH A FREEZING MACHINE.

Koopman & Wissbrod are installing in their Central market a refrigerating plant that will make them independent of the ice man and will give them the most modern retail establishment in their line in the state. The motor and pump are in the basement and the pipes which convey the brine solution lead to all parts of the market. In the basement has been built a new refrigerating room which will hold several tons of dressed beef; this will be used for the wholesale department business, the reserve retail stock will also be held here.

The most interesting application of the system, however, will be in the retail market. In the rear of the sales-room is the big refrigerator which was built there when the new market was constructed; this will be equipped with the freezing pipes from the plant below and will always be cold and dry. The glass counters of the market will also be equipped with the system and the cuts of meat ready for sale will be displayed behind plate glass in the refrigerating cases. In the windows will be glass cases for the display of meats and poultry, these also furnished with the refrigerating pipes.

It is said by the constructors of the plant that the system will produce frost, if desired, in these window show-cases on the hottest days of summer. It is expected that the new plant will be in operation next Monday, at the latest.
