NEW COMPANY FORMS ORGANIZATION

MICHIGAN MEN INCORPORATE TO TAKE OVER OLD TRIANGLE PROPERTY.

Articles of incorporation for the Montana Clinton Copper company were filed in the office of the county recorder yesterday afternoon, the incorporators being Patrick H. O'Brien, Thomas Bastien, Michael E. O'Brien and William J. Webb, all of Laurium, Mich. The company is organized to do a general mining business and to exist for 20 years, with a capitalization of \$1,500,000, divided into 300,000 shares. The principal offices of the company will be in Missoula. The directors named are Wesley Clark, Thomas Bastien, Michael E. O'Brien, Alexander Levin, Charles Kendall, Michael J. Harrington and H. Y. Gephart. Of the 300 shares of stock actually subscribed each director holds 100, with the exception of Mr. Gephart, who owns five.

It is announced that the Montana Clinton Copper company is to take over the Triangle property near Clinton, and that a large sum of money will be put into the developing of the mine. According to the statements made yesterday a saw mill will be built near the mine to prepare lumber for a concentrator to be put up by the Michigan men.

MILBURN KERN LOSES LAND CASE

REGISTER AND RECEIVER DECIDE IN FAVOR OF UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT.

The register and receiver of the local land office yesterday decided in favor of the government in the case of the United States against Milburn G. Kern, involving right to make final proof on his homestead entry for lots 1, 2 and 3 and the northeast quarter of the southeast quarter of section 13, township 6, north of range 19 west. The land was filed on August 5, 1901, final proof being offered on November 18, 1907. Immediately upon final proof being offered, L. L. Sharp, a land agent of the government, protested its acceptance, basing his objections on two reasons—first, that prior to April 22, 1905, entryman had not established and maintained a residence upon the land, and second, that prior to April 22, 1905, the land had not been cultivated.

In the hearing held before H. C. Packer, United States commissioner, at Hamilton January 25, 1909, witness for the protestant, the government, testified that there were several hundred dollars worth of improvements on the land, mostly in the form of mess houses, shearing pens, and so on; that the land, which consisted principally of rolling prairie, capable of cultivation, had not been plowed and cultivated nor were there any signs of cultivating tools around the premises; that the proof-claimant, Kern, resided in his \$10,000 residence north of Corvallis, and was engaged in the sheep business; that he visited the land only at such times as to attend to shearing and other business pertaining to the raising of sheep.

The proof-claimant failing to appear, and it being evident to the land officials that the land was filed upon simply for the purpose of furnishing grazing land for the sheep, and that a bona fide residence had not been made and maintained, it was recommended that final proof be rejected and that since the time for re-entry had passed, the entry be cancelled. Thirty days are allowed in which the entryman may appeal to the general commissioner at Washington, D. C.

MARGARET DEMARS DIES OF PNEUMONIA

Mrs. Margaret Demars, for 10 years a resident in this city, died about noon yesterday from the effects of pneumonia, from which she had been suffering since a week ago Saturday. She died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. William Longley, 639 Phillips street. She is survived by three daughters, Mrs. William Longley and Mrs. John Kritzer of this city and Mrs. Margaret Merrick, who is at Sacramento, Cal., and two sons, Theodore of Mandan, N. D., and Napoleon of Kilkenny, Minn. Her husband died several years ago. Mrs. Demars was born in Appleton, Wis., in 1833, and has lived with her daughters in this city for the last 10 years. Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.
