ALL WORK FINISHED SEPTEMBER 1

GRADE RECONSTRUCTION ON N. P. WILL BE COMPLETED IN FOUR MONTHS.

Said a Northern Pacific official yesterday, when asked about the progress of the reconstruction work being done on the division, especially that on the district between Missoula and Garrison: "We expect to be entirely cleaned up by September 1, and by that date should have a roadbed which will be fully settled and in fit condition for the heaviest and fastest moving traffic that has ever been passed over any division of the Northern Pacific." He followed up this statement by saying that the work was progressing with all possible rapidity consistent with substantial and permanent construction, and said that extra laboring forces were being added daily to the already large army of men employed on the division. The final touches have been put on the Paradise-St. Regis cut-off, and practically all the working equipment has been moved to the east end. The company has now nearly 2,000 men at work on the latter district and is operating nearly 30 work trains between Clinton and Garrison. There are now about 10 steam shovels tearing the material for ballasting and grade reinforcement purposes. It is not expected that any more work trains or automatic machinery will be needed to assist in the closing up of the work which has occupied nearly two years to finish.

ENGINEER MOONEY HURT.

J. P. Mooney, a Northern Pacific engineer, was rather badly injured yesterday while switching at Stuart, in this state. He was taken to a hospital in Butte and reports at first had it that his skull was crushed. It was announced later, however, that his injuries, although serious, are not necessarily fatal. Engineer Mooney resides in Missoula.

ENGINES ARE WRECKED AT TUSCOR STATION

Due to a misunderstanding on the part of either the telegraph operators at Naxon, Tuscor or Trout Creek, the trainmen or the dispatcher who issued the orders, passenger train No. 15 and an east-bound extra crashed together at Tuscor on Monday, wrecking both engines to a considerable extent. According to the statements of the train crews, each held train orders giving them rights to occupy the main line at Tuscor. Neither train was proceeding at a rate to exceed 10 miles an hour, and the rolling stock suffered little damage from the shock.

An inquiry is being held in Spokane, the result of which is to fix the responsibility for the accident. Three telegraph operators, both train crews and a dispatcher have been called to attend the investigation.

SUPERINTENDENT GOES TO WESTERN RESORT

Superintendent J. M. Rapelle leaves on No. 15 this morning for Green River Hot Springs, where he will remain until he has fully recuperated and recovered the strength lost as the result of the injuries caused by the accident at Belknap some weeks ago. Mr. Rapelle yesterday said that the soreness which has affected his back and shoulders since leaving the hospital does not diminish as rapidly as he wishes, and the opinion of his physicians is that the warmer weather at the springs, together with the benefits to be derived from the constant use of the warm waters which flow from the hills, are all that are now needed to fully restore the patient to a normal condition of health. Green River is a short distance west of Ellensburg, and has gained reputation as a health resort in the west.

S. H. Draper, air inspector of the Northern Pacific, expects to leave here about May 1 for Richmond, Va., to attend

the national convention of air brake inspectors, to be held in that city, beginning May 5.

T. H. Boyd, claim agent for the Puget Sound Railroad company, with headquarters at Deer Lodge, is in Missoula for a few days conferring with the local officials of his line.

The local examination board will arrive in Missoula this evening from Paradise and will continue the work of examining Rocky Mountain employees here.

George S. Snyder, a Northern Pacific dispatcher, is making a trip over the division.

JURY IS COMPLETED.

Flushing, N. Y., April 27.—The jury to try Captain Peter C. Hains for the murder of William E. Annis, his one-time friend, was completed today. The state will present its case tomorrow. All the jurymen are married except Otto Nicholas, who is 27 years old. The defense has fought all along for married men and peremptorily challenged the few bachelors who qualified.

BLACKMAILERS GET MONEY

OPERATORS IN UTAH HAVE THEIR DEMANDS COMPLIED WITH BY A FEW.

Salt Lake City, April 27.—The blackmailers who have been writing threatening letters to residents of Spanish Fork and other Utah county towns, have not been unremunerated for their labors. In the course of the investigation recently started it was learned that several citizens had been directed to place money under a bridge near Spanish Fork, and to mark the place of concealment with a cross. Four or five crosses were found on various parts of the bridge when it was examined, indicating that in that number of instances, at least, the demands of the bandits had been complied with.

New cases of attempted blackmail are coming to light daily. The cashier of the bank at Spanish Fork has received letters demanding \$400 and promising that the bank building would be dynamited if the money was not paid.

No arrests have been made as to the result of the hunt for evidence.

INDICTMENTS QUASHED.

Denver, April 27.—The 17 indictments against Judge Theron Stevens, George R. Hurlbut and Joseph Turner were quashed in Gannison yesterday by Judge Carlton M. Bliss of Denver. The indictments charged the men named, who were formerly officials of the defunct Bank of Duran, Col., with receiving deposits 30 days before the institution closed its doors, when it was charged, they knew the bank was insolvent.

WILL PRESERVE ORDER.

Paris, April 27.—Although the leaders of the General Federation of Labor, who are organizing a 24-hour strike for May 1, disclaim any violent or revolutionary intentions, the government is taking elaborate precautions to preserve order on that day.
