

DEPARTMENT HEADS NOT NAMED

MAYOR NEVIN OF BUTTE ONLY APPOINTS UNDER OFFICIALS OF THE CITY.

Butte, May 5.—Contrary to general expectations, Mayor Charles P. Nevin did not make his appointments tonight for the heads of the different departments and there is considerable disappointment in consequence. There was a crowd in attendance at the council meeting and all of the appointments made were confirmed without dissent. These were named: First assistant city clerk, Charles H. Treacy; second assistant city clerk, Charles Gorman; first assistant city treasurer, John J. Cotter; second assistant city treasurer, Mike Donohue; third assistant city treasurer, Clint McNeill; city electrician, Daniel L. Harley; assistant electrician, James Farrell; city engineer, M. A. Feeney; street commissioner, W. H. Nevin; health board clerk, W. H. Rex; city librarian, Granville Stuart; pound master, Peter Callahan.

A clash is expected when it comes to the naming of the chief of police and the head of the detective force, as both of these officers have expressed a determination to hold one, maintaining that they have been appointed for life under the terms of the recent law placing the Butte force under the metropolitan system. It is expected that the mayor will gradually weed out the police force, keeping the men who have been of most service and eliminating others.

NEW MEN LEARNING TO PRODUCE BEER

THE SOO LINE IS SPENDING A MILLION ON TUNNEL WORK



SOO LINE TUNNEL WORK.

St. Paul, Minn., May 4.—In order to gain its own entrance to St. Paul, the Soo line with which the Wisconsin Central has been consolidated, is spending \$1,000,000 on tunnel work. Its tracks will be carried in succession underneath the trackage of the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha railways, and after crossing the present railway lines into the city, the road must bore through bluffs which block its access to terminals acquired during the past three years. The site of the new terminals in-

clude what was once an exclusive St. Paul residence district. Old mansions dating from the early settlement of the city have been razed, and solid blocks of homes once surrounded by beautiful grounds have been completely blotted out. In addition the surface of the ground over the entire area is being cut down many feet, an enormous amount of excavation being necessary before the railway can obtain a proper level and avoid excessive grades.

The acquisition of the Wisconsin Central has been followed by the consolidation of the Soo line and Wisconsin Central offices in St. Paul. The business of the Wisconsin Central will

hereafter be handled through the Soo line. These recent changes, coupled with important branch line extensions in Minnesota and North Dakota, have made the Soo an important factor in the Northwestern situation and its entry into Chicago through the Wisconsin Central will further increase its importance in competing for traffic. The Soo line now has connection with both coasts in Canada through the Canadian Pacific, a direct line to Spokane and the west, connections with Chicago, and direct lines from the wheat-growing territory in which it is becoming a strong competitor of the Great Northern to terminal markets.

MONEY TRANSACTION DESCRIBED

WITNESS IN CALHOUN CASE TELLS OF CARRYING MONEY FROM THE MINT.

San Francisco, May 5.—The prosecution advanced another step today in presenting the case against Patrick Calhoun, charged with bribery of supervisors in connection with the over-head trolley franchise, by placing William M. Abbott, general attorney of the United Railroads, on the stand to tell of having taken from the mint in May, 1905, \$50,000 in currency, the money which the prosecution expects to show

was paid to the supervisors. Abbott went over the ground he had covered in previous trials. Abbott said that he had no knowledge of what became of the money.

In July, 1906, he again went with Tiley L. Ford to the mint and helped carry away \$100,000 in the same way. Of the final disposal of this sum he was ignorant.

Prior to the calling of Abbott, William P. Cole, cashier at the mint, was placed on the stand. He told of having received the telegraphic order from Calhoun to pay out both sums and said that the \$50,000 was paid in bills ranging from \$1 to \$20 denominations. Eugene C. Hawkins, assistant cashier, was called and told of having made up the packages of money which were taken away by Ford and Abbott.

Abbott's cross-examination will be taken up tomorrow morning.

DAM AT LAKE COMO IS SUBSTANTIAL

TRIP TO SCENE OF IRRIGATION WORK NEAR HAMILTON IS CONVINCING.

Hamilton, May 5.—There was a time when people of the valley would go to the shores of Lake Como when they wished to spend a day in quiet and seclusion. Now it would be the last place they would want to go for that purpose, for instead of finding a place of quiet they would face a scene of such activity as they had not gazed upon for many a day. The noise of the whistles and the general clamor of three steam shovels, a Shay engine, a locomotive, and seven "dinky" engines at work fill the air with such continuous noise that a person unused to like scenes would hesitate ere proceeding further. The dam, which has begun to assume shape, stretches for a half mile along the lower edge of the lake. The elevation of the dam will be 50 feet above the level of the lake and when completed it will raise the water 43 feet. It will be 30 feet wide at the top, the upper slope being 2 to 1 and the lower slope 4 to 1. It will be 400 feet wide at the bottom at the maximum point. It is of the sluiced earth type, having a central puddle core. It is constructed by depositing the dam material just as the shovels take it from the ground, on the side slopes and washing the clay and fine material into the central puddle trench. In addition there are two rows of surface cut-off sheeting of double lap 16 feet plank which serve to keep the dam center from shifting. There are three steam shovels, seven dinky engines and sufficient dump cars to move 3,000 yards of material per day, working day and night.

By June 1 the dam will be in shape to raise the water in the lake 20 feet for irrigating purposes this summer. There is a 6-foot outlet pipe and a temporary spillway to take care of the flood waters this spring. The reinforced concrete work about the outlet pipe and valve tower is completed. An average of 400 men are employed at the dam daily. Water for sluicing is obtained from a high line ditch and reaches the works through pipes under 700 feet head. In case the ditch should break at any time a pump station is being installed which will have great power. Also an electric light plant is being built to furnish lights for the night shift.

According to the reports of the head engineers of the ditch company and the government and also eastern engineers of repute who have visited at the lake, the dam will be absolutely safe and will hold water in fine shape. To anyone who has not been to the lake lately, it would prove interesting and instructive to take a trip there expressly to watch the work on the dam. Many visit the work weekly and come away satisfied that the dam is a substantial structure. Those who express their doubts as to whether the dam will hold or not are those who have not examined the work themselves.

SENTENCED TO DEATH.

Tillamook, Ore., May 5.—Adolph Nordstrom was sentenced to death this morning for the murder of John Peterson on February 23 last. The execution will take place June 18 at Salem, and is the first person to be sentenced to death in Tillamook county.

ACCUSED KIDNAPER ON TRIAL

JAMES H. BOYLE FACES COURT ON CHARGE OF STEALING THE WHITLA BOY

Mercer, Pa., May 5.—James H. Boyle, charged with the abduction of Willie Whittle of Sharon, Pa., was placed on trial at 2:45 o'clock today. When court adjourned one hour later, a jury composed mostly of farmers, had been selected temporarily. The prosecution today secured the following statement:

"Holy family church, Chicago: On the 4th day of February, 1905, I united in the bonds of matrimony Edward Shafer and Anna McDermott in this city, in the presence of John Butler and Mary Middleman, dispensation of differing religions having been obtained.

(Signed) "G. A. GONZER, S. J."

Father Gonzer, who is now stationed at Toledo, O., decided to come here to try to identify Mrs. Boyle as the woman he married to Shafer. The prosecution has had Mrs. Boyle summoned as a witness for the state against Boyle. But the refusal of the priest to attempt her identification likely will prevent such testimony by her.
