CATCHER BRESNAHAN INSURED BY OWNER

St. Louis, May 9.—Stanley Robinson, owner of the St. Louis National league club, has taken out a \$50,000 insurance policy on his manager and leading catcher, Roger Bresnahan. The policy runs for five years and the annual premium is \$1,300.

Bresnahan cost Robinson four good players valued at \$50,000 when he was bought from the New York National league team. He is under a three-year contract to play for \$25,000. This makes Robinson's investment \$75,000 in Bresnahan.

Bresnahan is known as a darling player and has been injured often.
