TWENTY-FOUR HANGED IN CONSTANTINOPLE

Constantinople, May 12.—Constantinople witnessed another batch of executions this morning when 24 murderers of the army and navy were hanged in public within the city limits. This makes a total of 26 executions within the capital since the revolution of April 12. Four of the men today were hanged near the sultan's palace, eight at the marine barracks, eight at the Djinnai Meidan quarters of Stamboul and four at the war office.

MINISTER ARGUES AGAINST ORTHODOXY

Boston, May 12.—Before the National Episcopal conference, Rev. Samuel McConnell of Easton, Maryland, denounced the orthodoxy as an obstruction to thought and trust, and said it remained for genius to break down its wall. He claimed it was impossible for a man of genius to be orthodox, while the spirit has always been opposed and always will be opposed to the spirit of truth.
