It was a heavy machine, and as it crashed into the train two passengers were seriously injured, while the chauffeur and the owner were killed. The car itself was reduced to matchwood.

## SMOKE EATERS WIN FROM LOCALS

**BUTTE DEFEATS MISSOULA HIGH SCHOOL BY ONE RUN IN LOOSE CONTEST.**

It was a large crowd of baseball enthusiasts and high school supporters which watched the Missoula high school baseball team go down to defeat at the hands of the Butte scholastics to the tune of 12 to 13 yesterday. In one of the poorest games of ball which has been seen this year on the south side grounds. From start to finish there was but little real ball playing on the part of either team, and the entire game was of regular corner lot quality. The poor playing was caused largely by the late arrival and the tired condition of the Butte team and by the stage fright which overtook the Missoula boys in their first real public appearance. Toward the end of the game both teams, Butte especially, began to pick up, and for several innings both teams put up a good article of ball. At one time during the game was Butte headed, and with the exception of the ninth inning, when the Missoula boys scored seven runs and came within one of tying the score, were they even in danger. Tremblay, who was in the box for Butte, received almost perfect support from his team, to which fact the defeat of the Missoula team is to be credited. The Slinky city lads, on the other hand, found Owsley, of the home aggregation, with uncomformable freedom at times, and hampered him all over the lot during almost the entire game. He was poorly supported.

### A Bad Start.

## MAY BUILD DREADNAUGHTS.

Rome, May 14.—The minister of marine, Admiral Mirabella, has obtained the approval of the cabinet to a range of values from \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000 for the construction of three dreadnaughts within three years, at a total expenditure of \$52,800,000, of which \$10,000,000 will be paid for the first two vessels and several fast scout cruisers. A local paper says the decision to build these vessels was reached after Italy had learned that Austria-Hungary was going to spend \$40,000,000 on increased naval power.

## STOCKMEN CONVICTED ON LARCENY CHARGE

Butte, May 14.—A Miner dispatch from Durango, Colo., says that two well-known ranchers and stockmen of the Big Horn basin country, were today found guilty of grand larceny in connection with the alleged slaughtering of cattle not their own, and their punishment fixed by the jury at one year each in the Deer Lodge penitentiary. The case was bitterly fought, a very determined effort being made to clear the two stockmen. Judge Holloway will pronounce sentence Saturday. The case will be carried to the supreme court.

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## HE WOULD REINSTATE CATHOLICS

**REDMOND INTRODUCES BILL IN PARLIAMENT TO REMOVE DISABILITIES.**

London, May 14.—A comprehensive bill for the removal of Roman Catholic disabilities and providing for an alteration in the accession oath taken by the British sovereign was introduced by William Redmond in the house of commons today.

The Roman Catholics never have ceased to inveigh against the "insulting references" to certain beliefs in the monarch's accession declaration as "superstitious." The same opposition has been met by the British effort to alter the oath again showed up today when a petition signed by 400,000 persons against the removal of Roman Catholic disabilities was handed in just before Mr. Redmond arose. Mr. Redmond's bill not only removes what is regarded as the objectionable portion of the oath of accession, but it repeals the acts prohibiting residence and the acquisition of property by the Jesuits and other monastic orders and abolishes the disqualification, which prevents Catholics from filling the offices of lord chancellor of Great Britain and lord lieutenant of Ireland. Premier Asquith gave his cordial support to the bill. He declared that the exclusion of Roman Catholics from the lord chancellorship and the lord lieutenantship was quite unjustifiable on the grounds of logic or policy.
