MRS. NEWLON DIES SUDDENLY

POPULAR AND BELOVED WOMAN OF MISSOULA IS CALLED TO GREAT BEYOND.

Mrs. E. A. Newlon, wife of the cashier of the First National bank of this city, and one of the most popular and best beloved women of Missoula, died at the family residence, 300 South Fifth street west, at 2:30 o'clock yesterday morning. Mrs. Newlon died of pulmonary embolism.

Mrs. Newlon was just 35 years of age, her death occurring upon her birthday, and was born in Helena, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Thoroughman, who at the present time live at Cascade, Mont.

Mr. and Mrs. Newlon came to Missoula about two years ago from Great Falls, and have endeared themselves to many people in this city who have made their acquaintance. Mrs. Newlon was known from one end of the city to the other, and was beloved by all. Her death, coming as suddenly as it did, was a shock to her family and friends, who, even yet, can hardly realize the blow that has fallen.

Many friends gathered at the family residence at 5 o'clock last evening to attend the funeral services, which were conducted by Rev. Walter Lennings-Smith of the Episcopal church. The remains, covered by many beautiful floral tributes, were taken to the depot and sent to Cascade for burial. Besides the bereaved family, George Newlon, a brother-in-law of the deceased, accompanied the remains to their last resting place.
