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MONTANA ATHLETES ARE GOOD

STATE HIGH SCHOOL MEN COMPARE WELL WITH THOSE OF OTHER STATES.

A new record in the Montana interscholastic meet causes as a rule, but little talk outside of the high school circles, and it is generally supposed that the records of the Montana athletes are but ordinary ones and far below those of similar meets in other states.

The six records which were broken at the meet in Pullman were in the 220-yard hurdles, in the discus hurl, the 220-yard dash, the mile run, the shot put and the pole vault, and they compare as follows with the Montana records.

The Montana State Sportsmen's association was organized in Butte, in 1892, and, with the exception of two years, has held tournaments each year since that time.

Rank High.

The tournaments given by the Montana State Sportsmen's association rank with those given by sportsmen's associations of other states, and while certain of its trophies and medals are open for competition only to residents of Montana who are members of its association, the greater number of its events are open to the world.

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IMPORTANT QUESTION IS DECIDED

COURT HOLDS THAT EXTRADITED MAN MAY BE TRIED FOR ANOTHER OFFENSE.

Washington, May 17.—The question whether a person who has been extradited from a foreign country to the United States on a specific charge made under a treaty with that country can be tried for another offense committed after his return and before he has been given a reasonable time in which to go back to the country from which he was brought, was involved in the case of George D. Collins versus Sheriff O'Neill of San Francisco, which was decided today by the United States supreme court.

In 1905 Collins was extradited from Victoria, B. C., to San Francisco on an indictment charging him with perjury. He testified for himself, and after the jury had disagreed was arrested on a charge of perjury. Of this he was convicted, whereupon he got out a writ of habeas corpus on the theory that he could not legally be tried upon any other charge than that upon which he was extradited.
