## BURNING OIL CAUSES BAD FIRE

THE SMITH DRUG STORE IS DAMAGED AS THE RESULT OF EXPLODING CREAM.

Fire broke out yesterday morning in David Smith's drug store while the druggist and his assistant were busy with customers, and before it could be gotten under control the heat had become so great that it had broken the bottles and show cases all over the store, causing a loss which was estimated by Mr. Smith last night as being fully \$2,000. Mr. Smith and his clerk had been working over the stove, preparing some cold cream, and had left the stove to wait on customers in the front part of the store. While they were gone the oil in the cream melted and, blazing up, got a quick hold on the adjoining walls. Mr. Smith was unable to do anything, and before long the heat, which he described as being terrific, had driven him from the building. The fire department responded quickly, however, and soon had the fire under control by the use of chemicals.

Speaking of the fire last night, Mr. Smith said: "It all came so suddenly that we were unable to do anything, and had it not been for the quick response of the department the loss would have been much greater. The heat was awful, and while the fire itself was confined to the back room, the heat cracked bottles all over the store and even broke the trunks in front. I would like to say that the fire department is deserving of great praise for its work and that the way that they put the fire under control was wonderful. We are still able to continue working, and while the loss was great, probably two or three thousand dollars, I am thankful that it was not greater."

## OFFICERS INSPECT THE MILITARY POST

Colonel Rockwell, as chief of ordnance, and Colonel J. E. Sawyer, chief quartermaster of the department of the Dakotas, are at Fort Missoula inspecting the post. The officers are on a tour of inspection of all the posts in the department, and came to the local post from Fort Harrison, at Helena. After remaining here for a few days they will continue their tour until all the forts have been examined.

Colonel Rockwell, as chief of ordnance, is inspecting the ordnance of the local post, and yesterday was on the target range examining the work of the new army Springfield rifles.

Colonel Sawyer is inspecting the post in relation to its supplies and such like. He will examine the estimates for the coming fiscal year as prepared by the post commandant, and will make such recommendations as he sees fit.

One of the matters which has been brought to the attention of the colonel is the need for new means of transportation—such as horses, mules and vehicles. Colonel Johnson, post commandant, has sent to the department recommendations that new transportation be furnished the fort, as the present facilities are inadequate to meet the demands made upon them.
