JACK O'BRIEN FIGHTS JOHNSON TO STANDSTILL AND EARNS DRAW

Philadelphia Man, Showing Marvelously Fast Foot Work and Superior Blocking, Holds Big, Black Champion Safe While the Crowd Cheers Lustily.

Philadelphia, May 19.—Jack Johnson, the big colored heavyweight champion, failed to win over Jack O'Brien, the Philadelphia light heavyweight, in a six-round bout tonight. The fight was even, and the consensus of opinion was that it should have been a draw had a decision been permissible.

It was a fast fight, O'Brien doing the greater part of the leading. Johnson was slow on his feet, and appeared not to be in the best of condition. Repeatedly the champion rushed his smaller antagonist, but seldom landed effectively.

In and Out Like Flash. O'Brien was in and out like a flash in nearly every round, stabbing Johnson on the face, but the blows lacked force and had no effect other than to make the big black man grin and wave his hand at the crowd.

Black Has Nothing to Say. Johnson looked tired and anxious in the fourth and O'Brien appeared confident throughout the bout. He certainly fought a game fight, said McGaughan.

Johnson had nothing to say after the bout, except that he thought he had the better of it. O'Brien was enthusiastic over his showing. He said today he accepted a proposal to meet Al Kaufmann in San Francisco in the near future.

O'Brien appeared to be in splendid shape as he took off his bath robe. Johnson seemed rather bulky about the waistline, but splendid muscles stood out on arms and shoulders.

First Is Even. First round—Johnson rushed O'Brien to the ropes. O'Brien came back with the better of it. O'Brien was enthusiastic over his showing.

O'Brien Does Cleaner Work. Second round—O'Brien landed for the first time, but was blocked and Johnson lifted him off his feet in the clinch that followed.

No Advantage in Third. Third round—Johnson missed left and took a light stab in the face in return. O'Brien was in and out like a flash, landing left on the face, but took a stiff left to the stomach at close range.

O'Brien Has a Shade. Fourth round—O'Brien put left to the face and took right on the body, and they sparred cautiously.

Negro Draws Blood. Fifth round—Johnson caught O'Brien a left on the face and O'Brien went down, but was up like a flash and fighting strongly.

Ends in Clinch. Sixth round—They shook hands gingerly for the winnow and sparred cautiously. O'Brien led a left which landed on the body good and hard.

Telegrams and Celebrities. A telegram was read from Billy DeLaney, challenging Johnson on behalf of Al Kaufmann for a fight in San Francisco.

Jeffries Not Surprised. Chicago, May 19.—"Nothing that Johnson can do in or out of the ring makes the slightest difference to me," said James J. Jeffries, when he heard the result of the O'Brien-Johnson fight tonight.
