# BODY IS SENT HOME FOR BURIAL

THE REMAINS OF MRS. WILLIAM F. KOEHLER TO BE INTERRED IN CALIFORNIA.

The body of Mrs. William F. Koehler, the woman who met death at her own hands Sunday morning, was shipped yesterday to Pasadena, Cal., the home of her parents, for burial. The body was escorted to the depot by the members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, who had decided at a meeting held yesterday morning in the firemen's hall to conduct the funeral. The dead woman was a member of the Baptist church here and many of the local congregation were also present to pay her the last honors. Mr. Koehler went with the body, taking with him his two older children, who will make their home in the future with their grandparents in Pasadena. The youngest child was left here at the home of Mrs. Paul Geis, who has been an intimate friend of the dead woman and whose husband accompanied the body as the representative of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers. The pallbearers yesterday were Charles Oysterman, Neis Olsen, John Noonan, C. A. Beebe, Henry McCulloch and Hugh Ross, all of whom are warm friends of Mr. Koehler.

Notice is hereby given to owners and agents of property on West Spruce street between Woody street and the intersection of West Spruce street with Toole avenue, within proposed special improvement district No. 3 of the city of Missoula, that at a meeting of the council of said city of Missoula, Mont., held on the 17th day of May, 1909, the following resolution, No. 45A, was passed, subject to final passage and adoption by said city council at a meeting thereof to be held on Monday, the 7th day of June, 1909, at 8 o'clock p. m. of said day, when and where any and all persons interested may appear and object to the final passage and adoption of said resolution, or to the improvements therein proposed. RESOLUTION NO. 45A. A resolution to create special improvement district No. 3 in the city of Missoula, Mont., for the purpose of building and constructing concrete-cement sidewalks, curbs, culverts and street crossings, and planting grass plots, parking, removing trees and planting new ones, boulevarding and grading and placing gravel or crushed rock upon and along all that portion of West Spruce street between Woody street and the intersection of West Spruce street with Toole avenue.

Whereas, It is the intention of the council of the city of Missoula, Mont., to create a special improvement district in said city for the purpose of building and constructing concrete-cement sidewalks, curbs, culverts and street crossings, making and planting grass plots, parking, removing trees and planting new ones, boulevarding and grading and placing gravel or crushed rock upon, changing fire hydrants where necessary, and for the purpose of making other improvements hereinafter set forth, and whereas, assessments for which are to be made in installments and are to extend over a period of eight years, and the cost of which special improvements is to be paid for by special improvement warrants, and the entire expense (less any amount which may be payable by any person or corporation occupying any part of the street under a franchise) of all improvements within the special improvement district herein created, including the cost of all alley and street intersections, shall be paid by the entire district, each lot or parcel of land within the district to be assessed for the same, and the whole cost which its area bears to the area of the entire district, exclusive of streets, alleys and public places;

And Whereas, An approximate estimate of the cost of the improvements herein set forth has been made and is hereby declared to be as follows: One hundred dollars (\$100 per lot of 30 feet wide and 150 feet deep, and a total cost of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000).

Be it resolved by the council of the city of Missoula, Mont.: That the special improvement district hereby created be and the same is hereby designated and known as special improvement district No. 3.

That the boundaries of said special improvement district No. 3 are hereby fixed and described as follows, to wit: Beginning at a point in the city of Missoula where the center line of Woody street intersects the center line of West Spruce street, and thence north along the center line of said Woody street 159 1-2 feet; thence west 40 feet, more or less to the center line of the alley running easterly and westerly through block 8, C. P. Higgins' addition to the town of Missoula, and block 6, 40, 29 and 28, W. J. McCormick's addition to the town of Missoula, and across Owen, McCormick, May and Blanche streets to the north line of section 21, township 13 north of range 19 west; thence west along said section line to a point where said section line is intersected by the center line of the alley running southerly along the center line of Maple street to a point opposite the center line of the alley running easterly and westerly through block 14, W. J. McCormick's addition; thence easterly 40 feet, more or less to the center line of said alley in said block 44; thence easterly along the center line of the alley running through blocks 44, 43, 41, 35 and 14, W. J. McCormick's addition, and block 13, C. P. Higgins' addition, and crossing Blanche street, May street, McCormick street, Owen street and Harris street to the center line of Woody street; thence northerly along the center line of Woody street 159 1-2 feet to the place of beginning.

Said special improvement district No. 3 comprises lots 11 to 29, inclusive, in block 8, C. P. Higgins' addition; lots 13 to 24, inclusive, in block 7, in C. P. Higgins' addition; lots 16 to 26, inclusive, in block 6; lots 11 to 19, inclusive, in block 40; lots 11 to 20, inclusive, in block 29; lots 11 to 19, inclusive, in block 28; all of fractional block 37; lots 1 to 19, inclusive, in block 44; lots 1 to 19, inclusive, in block 43; lots 1 to 19, inclusive, in block 41; lots 1 to 19, inclusive, in block 15, and lots 1 to 12, inclusive, in block 14 in W. J. McCormick's addition, and lots 1 to 19, inclusive, in block 13, C. P. Higgins' addition to the town of Missoula.

That the character of the improvements which are to be made in said improvement district is described as follows: To grade that portion of said West Spruce street included in this improvement district 15 feet in width, between curbs, placing thereon either gravel or crushed rock to a depth of either four or 6 inches; to build and construct concrete-cement curbs immediately adjoining said roadway and on each side thereof, each curb to be placed 19 1-2 feet from the property line, the 19 1-2 feet space to be divided and utilized as follows: A strip two feet wide adjacent to the property line, and also a strip 1-2 feet wide adjacent to the curb to be planted and arranged for grass plots, trees to be planted in a row along the center line of the strip adjacent to the curbs, trees spaced 20 feet apart; concrete-cement sidewalks five feet in width to be built between strips of parking; concrete-cement street crossings to be built across streets connecting sidewalks, and culverts built across streets; trees now growing on said street to be removed and new trees planted in place thereof; fire hydrants to be changed from present locations where necessary; irrigating taps to be placed at necessary points.
