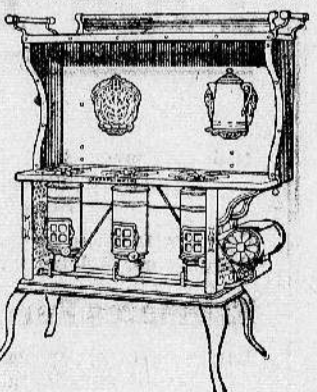

## LICK CREEK MEETING INSTRUCTIVE

FOREST SERVICE PEOPLE HOLD SUCCESSFUL SESSION IN BITTER ROOT VALLEY.

Now that the rangers' meeting at Lick Creek is over and the local forest officials have returned to the city, it is announced that the session was a most enjoyable and instructive one, and one that will be long remembered. Most of the officials left Missoula for Hamilton on Friday, May 21, proceeding the next day to Lick Creek, where the tents were pitched and camp made. About 27 rangers, many of them with their families, were present, besides those from Missoula, making a total in attendance of about 40 persons. The first few evenings were spent around the camp fires in a most enjoyable manner.

**Contests.** On Sunday rifle and revolver contests between rangers representing the Lolo and Bitter Root national forests were held. The Lolo team was the winner with revolvers, the highest individual score being made by H. P. Barringer, who, for his good work, was awarded a briarwood pipe. The Bitter Root squad won the rifle contest, the best shooting being done by James D. Vance, who received a hunting knife as prize.

On Monday the serious work of the meeting commenced. The meeting was called to order by Superintendent Koch and, after a brief discussion of the purposes and object of the assembly, A. W. Cooper, chief of silviculture from the district office at Missoula, gave a talk on timber sales. He took up the general timber sale policy of the forest service, including the methods of determining the annual cut on each forest, the determination of prices of timber, and a general outline of what the service expected to accomplish in the future through the regulation of timber sales.

**Problems Discussed.** Following this was a general discussion of all problems in connection with timber sales. Most of the district rangers are authorized to sell timber up to \$50 in value, and all of them are frequently called upon to make reports and estimates for larger sales, so that the greatest interest in the question was manifested and the discussion was very lively.

The meeting then adjourned to the woods and made an inspection of the timber cutting of the Anaconda Copper Mining company in the national forest on Lick Creek. The system of marking the timber for cutting was studied by actual demonstration on the ground, which will be of great value to such of the rangers as were not familiar with the large timber sales, as many of them are apt to be obliged to mark timber for cutting, and such a practical demonstration is worth more than any amount of written instruction.

In the afternoon the party made a trip to the timber sale on Bunkhouse Creek for further inspection of the timber cutting, visiting the Lake Como reservoir en route.

**Quiggle Talks.** Tuesday morning the meeting was opened by E. B. Quiggle of the district office, who gave a talk on claims. Before any claim in the national forest goes to patent it is the duty of the forest officers to make a detailed report showing whether the laws have been complied with. This necessitates a considerable knowledge of the land laws and regulations on the part of each ranger, and there are a great many perplexing questions which come up from time to time. The rangers were given opportunity to ask questions and discuss all the different points which have come up in their previous experience.

Following this discussion, C. H. Gregory, lumber man in the forest service, gave a talk on scaling, followed by actual demonstration on the sidewalks.

On the larger timber sales on the forests expert scalers are generally employed, but the average forest ranger is always obliged to do more or less scaling on a small scale and free use permits, and this opportunity to get some expert instructions on a difficult subject requiring a great deal of experience to do properly was very welcome. Mr. Gregory discussed methods of allowing for the various kinds of defects, illustrating by actually scaling logs which possessed these defects, and the rangers were given practice in doing the scaling themselves.

**Address by Greeley.** In the afternoon District Forester Greeley addressed the meeting briefly on the development of the district ranger and his future in the service. He showed the gradual development from the earlier days of the forest reserves, when a forest supervisor could not even issue a free use permit without referring the matter to the Washington office, to the present time when practically all work is handled on the ground. The supervisor at present makes timber sales in amounts varying from 250,000 to 1,000,000 feet, issues all sorts of special use permits, grazing permits, etc., and in most things is directed only in matters of general policy by the district office. The district ranger makes timber sales up to \$50 in value, issues free use permits and decides many questions which formerly had to be referred to Washington. Mr. Greeley showed that the position of district ranger would become more and more desirable in the future. In most cases he will be supplied with a comfortable house, pasture for his horses, and a cultivated field where he can raise a garden, and in many cases enough hay to feed his horses during the winter. These perquisites added to his pay makes the position a very desirable one.

Following Mr. Greeley's talk was a

general discussion by all present of the various problems arising in connection with the free use of timber, fire fighting, timber trespass, claims, etc. This discussion was heartily entered into by all the rangers, and many questions which had bothered them were freely discussed and conclusions reached to guide in future cases.

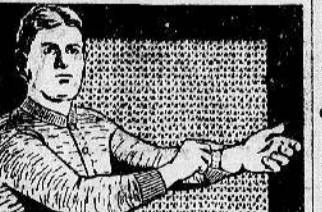

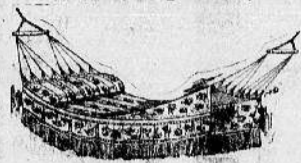

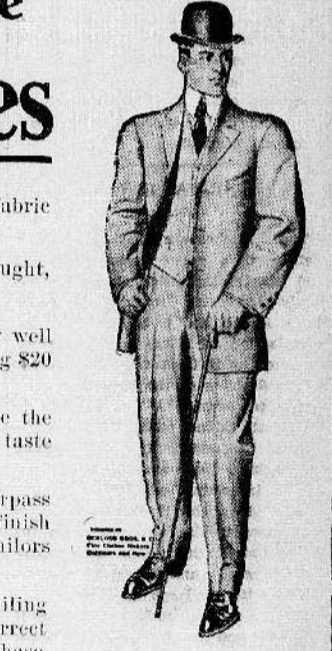
