TURKISH OFFICIALS HAVE BEEN BANISHED

Constantinople, May 28.—A number of the ministers and other high functionaries of the late regime, who have been confined on the island of Prinkipo, have been deported to other islands in the Sea of Marmora. An imperial edict will be read tomorrow at the ministries of war and marine setting forth that the sultan, in accordance with the terms of the constitution, is the supreme commander of the army and of the navy.

MOB STORMS PRISON AND KILLS PRISONER

Abilene, Texas, May 28.—At 1 o'clock this morning a mob stormed the county jail here and shot to death Tom Barnett, recently convicted of the murder of Alexander Sears. Refused admission by the jailer the mob worked unsuccessfully for an hour to open the cell doors. Then the victim was shot to death inside his cell. The proceedings were conducted with comparative quiet, and but a few citizens were aware of the lynching until it was over.

OPPRESSION CAUSES INSPECTION JOURNEY IS ENDED TROUBLE

KENTUCKY SENATOR ATTRIBUTES NIGHT RIDER OUTRAGES TO TRUST. DIRECTOR NEWELL AND MR. SAVAGE MAKE TRIP THROUGH YELLOWSTONE PARK.

Washington, May 28.—That the outrages of the night riders in Kentucky and Tennessee resulted from the oppression of the American Tobacco company, and that unless the internal revenue tax on leaf tobacco in the hands of the grower was reduced, the situation would remain as it is, was the declaration made by Senator Bradley of Kentucky today in urging the adoption of his amendment to the senate bill. The amendment proposes to restore in the tariff bill the tobacco provision for the free sale of leaf tobacco to the farmer, which was stricken out by the finance committee of the senate. After reviewing the growth of the American Tobacco company, Mr. Bradley said that, not content with destroying all competition in the United States, this concern drove the Imperial Tobacco company of Great Britain, its chief competitor, to a compromise and obtained an agreement by which the Imperial company yielded up all competition in the United States.

Helena, May 28.—The lower Yellowstone project of the United States reclamation service was formally opened by the secretary of the Interior and the waters turned into the main canal system April 30, said Supervising Engineer H. N. Savage of the reclamation service in this district today. "The water is now traversing the entire length of the system and is available for delivery to land owners. This season 5,000 acres of land can be brought under irrigation in the project. "The Northern Pacific Railroad company entered into a contract with the secretary of the Interior before the work was started on the project, agreeing to dispose of its holdings, comprising about one-third of the land, at not to exceed \$3 per acre, plus the cost of reclamation, thus putting their lands practically on the same basis as the public land. "Director F. H. Newell and myself have just completed a trip of inspection over the several projects in this territory. The director was much gratified over the development and the progress being made by engineers on the new projects. Billings on the Dumfries project continue at the rate of one in every two or three days, and at about the same rate on other projects where public lands are open to homestead entry.
