**RESOLUTION NO. 47A.**  
A resolution to create a special improvement district No. 47A, within the city of Missoula, Montana, for the purpose of building and constructing concrete-cement sidewalks, curbs, culverts and street crossings, making and planting grass plots, parking, grading, boulevarding, placing gravel or crushed rock upon, changing the location of fire hydrants where necessary, and for the purpose of making other improvements hereinafter set forth: The payment of assessments for which are to be made in installments and are to extend over a period of eight years, and the cost of said special improvements is to be paid by special improvement warrants, and the entire expense, less any amount which may be paid by any person or corporation occupying any part of the street under a franchise, of all improvements within said special improvement district hereby created, including the cost of all street intersections, shall be paid by the land owner, each lot or parcel of land within the district to be assessed for the same, and the whole cost which its area bears to the whole cost of the district, exclusive of streets, alleys and public places.

And, Whereas, An approximate estimate of the cost of the improvements hereinafter set forth has been made and is hereby declared to be as follows: One hundred dollars (\$100) per lot of 30 feet wide and 120 feet deep, in a total cost of \$25,000.

**Grains and Provisions.**  
Chicago, May 28.—Additional unfavorable reports regarding the wheat crop in Kansas caused an advance in wheat prices today, but nearly all the gain was lost in profit taking prices at the close being unchanged to 1 cent higher compared with yesterday's final figures.

The market opened rather weak owing to bearish foreign advices which were reflected in declines at nearly all the principal European grain markets. Local weather conditions in this country for the new crop and to liberal receipts in the northwest. Toward the middle of the session the market rallied materially on buying, based chiefly on a second report from a local crop expert who is now investigating the wheat crop in Kansas. The market, with the exception of the May delivery, eased off again late in the day on profit taking and closed about steady. During the day the May delivery sold between \$1.31 1/2 and \$1.32 1/2 and closed at \$1.33. Deliveries on May contracts announced after trading had closed for the day were larger than had been expected, being 63,000 bushels.

Trade in oats was active. The close was firm.

Trading in provisions was heavy and a fairly steady tone was maintained all day. At the close prices were 2 1/2c lower to the higher.

Lead was lower at \$13.25-50 in London. The local market was firm and a shade higher at \$13.50-45.

Spelter was unchanged at \$22.25-60 in the London market and remained firm at \$5.17 1/2-56.25 locally.

**COMMISSIONERS MEET AT CAPITAL CITY**

Washington, May 28.—Commissioners and counsel operating under the treaty between Great Britain and the United States providing for the adoption of uniform and effective measures for the protection of the food fish in the waters contiguous to the United States and Canada, met here today at the state department. Professor David Starr Jordan, is the United States representative and Professor Edward Prince the British representative, while C. P. Anderson is legal adviser on the part of this government and N. S. Grisbourne on the part of Canada. The commissioners have been at work for about a year and have completed a set of regulations to govern fishing which, if adopted by both governments, will go far towards protecting and preserving the fish and will avoid friction and strife.

Recent dispatches from Canada have intimated that the agreement reached by the commissioners is in the main satisfactory to that government. As soon as accepted by both governments it will be proclaimed.
