## A RUSSIAN ENGINEER TO ATTEND

OFFICIAL WILL VISIT IRRIGATED DISTRICTS THEN GO TO SPOKANE.

Spokane, May 31.—Eugene Skorniakoff, consulting engineer of the department of agriculture, stationed at St. Petersburg, Russia, who will represent the Russian government at the seventeenth session of the National Irrigation congress in Spokane, August 9 to 14, writes from Washington, D. C., to R. Insinger, chairman of the board of control, that he will visit the irrigated districts in Colorado, Montana and Wyoming in June and part of July, arriving in Spokane early in August. He will remain in Denver until June 16. He will also look over the government and private irrigation districts in the three states, after which he expects to visit parts of North and South Dakota, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, Utah, Nevada and California.  
"The coming of Mr. Skorniakoff, who probably is the most distinguished engineer in Russia, is of prime importance, and means much for the congress," said Mr. Insinger, "and we believe that the report that he will make to his government will mean much to the people of Russia. As he will visit many of the irrigated districts of the west, it is apparent that the government is interested in the solution of such problems as reclamation of arid and swamp lands, forestry, good roads and the conservation of natural resources.  
"We shall give Mr. Skorniakoff every assistance in his quest for information, and we know that the officials in the irrigated districts he is to visit will do likewise."

## MUST ANSWER CHARGE IN THE U. S. COURT

Spokane, May 31.—Charged with holding up the Great Northern mail train at Colbert, Wash., May 15, Benton J. Cofer and Bert Cofer have been bound over to the United States court after a preliminary hearing before Commissioner J. W. Marshall. Bail was fixed at \$10,000 each and the men were remanded to jail.  
Engineer W. D. Miller identified Benton Cofer as the man who covered him with a revolver and Fireman Hall declared he faced another gun with Bert Cofer behind it.

Tait of the First Methodist Episcopal church will officiate. After the services the body will be taken to the train and shipped to Portland, Ore. The body will be accompanied by a sister, Miss Emma Shoep, who came here from her home in Minot, N. D.

## OLD SOLDIER DIES IN BONNER

VETERAN G. A. R. MAN DROPS DEAD ON WAY TO WORK IN MILLING TOWN.

Yesterday, far away from home and friends, Charles Schwartz, an old Union soldier and a member of the Grand Army of the Republic, died in Bonner. The old man came to the west from Fort Wayne, Ind., several years ago in hope of relieving a serious heart trouble and it was this disease which caught him at last and which brought about his death.

Yesterday morning at 6:15 o'clock he appeared at the boarding house for breakfast and after finishing the meal went to his little house near the mill to prepare for his day's labor. This was the last his friends saw of him alive. At dinner he was missed and a search was at once instituted, with the result that the old man was found dead in his bed. The coroner was at once telephoned for and the remains were removed to Missoula.

From what could be learned yesterday the old soldier was a harness-maker by trade and has been working in that capacity for the Big Blackfoot Milling company for some time, having previously been employed in Missoula. Aside from this, little was known by his fellow workers except that he was a very congenial person, well liked by all who knew him. His bunkmate, the man who found him, said that the dead man had been receiving treatment for some time at the Sisters' hospital and that he had not expected to live long.

His papers when examined showed that he had come from Fort Wayne and that he was a harness-maker by trade. A letter was found from a nephew at Fort Wayne and he was notified at once of the death. His papers showed that he was 72 years old and that he was a member of St. Ignace, Bass post, No. 40, Fort Wayne, Ind., of the G. A. R. In addition to the big bank account which he had, \$1,200.65, was found on his person. The coroner has announced that he does not consider an inquest necessary.

### AT ODD FELLOWS' HALL.

The funeral of Albert M. Robinson, who died Sunday at St. Patrick's hospital from a scalding received in a wreck at Mill creek last week, will be held tomorrow. The services will be held at the Odd Fellows' hall at 10 o'clock. After the services the body will be taken to the depot and placed on No. 4 to be taken to La Crosse, Wis. The remains will be accompanied by the widow.


