PLANNING TO STOCK LAKES

THOUSANDS OF STEELHEAD SALMON TO BE PLACED IN SPOKANE COUNTY WATERS.

Spokane, June 4.—One hundred and fifty thousand young steelhead salmon will be distributed in the lakes of Spokane county at the close of the summer. A large number of eggs have been taken to the state hatchery on the Little Spokane river by S. S. Drew, superintendent, from the Skykomish hatchery near Everett, Wash. J. A. Uhler, state game warden, said: "The particular advantage of the steelhead is that they mature rapidly and they thrive as well in fresh as in salt water. If the young fish were put into the streams they would make their way back to salt water, but in the inland lakes they will thrive as well as any variety of fresh water fish. In three or four years the fish raised here this season will be of good size. A small supply was planted in a small lake up in the mountains above Chelan, Wash., four years ago, and this season fish weighing as high as nine pounds have been caught there.

There are in the state 22 fish hatcheries, 18 of which are on the west side, and are hatching salmon exclusively. The other four are giving part of their attention to other varieties.

The hatchery at Sandhi has secured 4,000,000 salmon eggs of one variety and expects to secure 2,000,000 more of the same kind, and an equal number of another variety this season.

But for the hatcheries, it is contended the salmon packing business, which is one of the leading industries of Washington, could not be continued.

Every packer or dealer who handles salmon in any way is required to pay a license fee, and the money so collected is used to pay the expenses of maintaining the hatcheries. Some of the larger packers on the sound pay as high as \$3,000 for yearly license, paying at the rate of 90 cents a ton on their output. The man who catches the fish in a trap or net pays a license for the privilege, and every canner or dealer who handles the fish thereafter pays some kind of a license. The small dealer in this or any other city in the state who sells salmon at retail pays an annual license fee of \$2.50, which is the smallest fee on the list.

Great Falls, June 4.—The annual tournament of the Montana State Sportsmen's association opened here today with a good attendance. In the ten general average events, Irvine of Great Falls and Conlar of Livingston tied for first place with 149 each out of a possible 160. Joe Tom led the professionals, having 151 out of a possible 160. Weaver of Kendall won the Brownlee medal for individual shooters.

The Kendall team, composed of Weaver, Wilson and Gallant, won the three-men team shoot, with Great Falls second. There were 75 entrants in today's shooting, and more are expected tomorrow.

At a business meeting held this evening, Frank Woody of Missoula was chosen president, Larry Stephens of Missoula vice president and C. H. Smith of Butte secretary. Missoula was chosen for the next year's meeting.

PRELIMINARY HEATS IN CONFERENCE MEET

Marshall Field, Chicago, June 4.—Only the preliminary heats in the quarter-mile run in the conference meet tomorrow were held on Marshall field today. Enough athletes did not appear in the half mile, pole vault and high jump to necessitate these preliminary heats. Leland Stanford was the only college to qualify for two men for the finals, both Miller and Wyman winning easily. The University of Chicago was conspicuous by its absence as Coach Stagg apparently did not think any of his quarter-milers strong enough to win this event. Two men qualified in each heat.
