NINE BIG BALLOONS CAST LOOSE FROM MOORINGS

GAS BAGS OFF TO GOOD START IN ENDURANCE AND DISTANCE RACES.

Indianapolis, June 5.—Nine balloons were cast loose from their moorings late this afternoon at the Motor speedway, five miles northwest of this city, and sailed in a straight line over the city, six competing in the national distance race for the trophy of the Aero club of America, and three for the cup offered by the Indiana Aero club to the pilot, and his aide that shall be able to stay aloft the longest period.

Thousands of people witnessed the start. The first starters, beginning at 3:45 o'clock, were the three entered in the Indiana endurance race: Dr. H. W. Thompson of Salem, Ohio, and W. E. Mast of Canton, Ohio, in the Ohio; Dr. Goetholink and J. R. Irvin of Indianapolis, in the Indianapolis; John Bennett of Chicago, in the Chicago. All rose easily and to about the same altitude and started toward the southern horizon.

The national distance race started at 5 o'clock and the contestants sailed off in a file to the south in the following order:

A. Holland Forbes and Clifford Harmon of New York, in the New York; Carl G. Fisher and G. L. Rumbaugh of Indianapolis, in the Indiana; A. E. Lambert and A. Honeywell of St. Louis, in the St. Louis III; A. H. Morgan and J. E. Wade, Jr., of Cleveland, in the Cleveland; Captain T. S. Baldwin of New York and Charles Walsh of Mount Vernon, N. Y., in the Hoosier, and John Berry and John McCulloch of St. Louis, in the University City.

Chicago Heard From. Bargersville, Ind., June 6.—The following message was dropped from the balloon Chicago, which passed over this town this evening: "We are sailing over Bargersville, Ind., Time, 5:30. We are going as far as the wind goes. Are out for distance record. Regards."



ILLINOIS CAPTURES CHAMPIONSHIP HONORS

WESTERN CONFERENCE MEET DEVELOPS STRONG CONTENDER IN STANFORD.

Marshall Field, Chicago, June 5.—The University of Illinois captured the western conference track and field meet championship with a total of 26 points. Leland Stanford university was second with 23 points, and the University of Chicago, third, with 21 points. The following are the scores of the other teams: Wisconsin, 12; Purdue, 6; Minnesota, 5; Michigan, 5; Colorado, 5; Western Reserve, 4; Miami, 4; Indian, 3; Notre Dame, 3; Knox, 1; Iowa, 1; Northwestern, Ripon Lake Forest and Beloit failed to score. The Illinois team was by far the best balanced organization and clinched the meet by winning the relay race from Chicago.

When the relay was started Illinois had 31 points; Leland Stanford, 25 and Chicago, 18. The victory for the Pacific coast athletes would have swung the tide to the Stanford team, but the two first runners, Stoltz and Scott, dropped so far behind that it was impossible for the two speedy westerners, Miller and Wyman, to put the team back into the race. No records were broken.

MINERS MAUL MOUND MEN.

Butte, June 5.—Butte today fell upon the Boise pitchers with a vengeance, hammering them to all points of the lot in a manner that made the local victory almost listless. Boise tried out three pitchers, Pender, Westall and Wilson, with poor success. Osborn held Boise down until Butte's lead became so great there was no danger and then he let up and was batted freely.


