MARKET MOVEMENTS OF THE DAY

New York, June 5.—The adjusted speculation in stocks went prosperously on its way today. This was the very heavy realization obvious in the irregular movement of prices, the stocks which were strongest yesterday dipping under the weight of this selling. Stocks not before included in the advance were moved upward to maintain the market against the realizing sales in the older favorites. The conviction that speculative capitalists of the largest resources were conducting the principal operation was thus fostered. The bank statement offered a sharp admonition on the money situation, and a presentiment of its complexion may have influenced the increase in the selling of stocks which made the closing reaction. Instead of an expected moderate gain in cash the banks have lost \$2,855,000 in the averages and \$3,310,000 in the actual comparison. Part of this has gone into the institutions outside the clearing house, which have increased their cash averages for the week \$1,184,000 to keep pace with the increasing reserve requirements produced by their loan expansion. The loan item is the striking feature of the bank statement in all its phases. Clearing house loan averages have increased \$11,185,400, and the actual increase Friday night reached \$19,987,400. The shrinkage in surplus, which is the net result, leaves that item for the clearing house banks in the neighborhood of \$10,000,000 by the average and actual computation. The loan account is further extended by the increase in the average loans of banks and trust companies outside the clearing house of \$6,527,000. This rate of loan expansion serves as a warning of the requirements of an active speculation in stocks at the same time with heavy fluctuations of securities. New York's debit account is supposed to be growing rapidly by borrowing abroad also. Bonds were strong. Total sales, par value, \$4,357,000.

Grain and Provisions.

Chicago, June 5.—The wheat market was weak early owing to quite general selling brought out by cool weather in this country and Canada and by the heaviness of the Liverpool grain market. During the last half of the day, however, the July delivery developed considerable strength, but the market continued weak all day. Crops generally were of a better nature. The government report to be issued Tuesday was expected to show a considerable improvement in the condition of the crop, and there was liberal selling of the December option by commission houses on this theory late in the day. There was an active demand for the cash grain and the market was strong. No. 2 red being quoted at \$1.00, July raised between \$1.18 1/2 and \$1.19 and closed irregular at \$1.18 1/2.

Oats were weak because of good weather in this country and the heaviness of corn. Prices at the close were 1/2c to 3/4c below yesterday's final figures.

Provisions were quiet and steady, closing 2 1/2c lower to 2 1/2c higher.

STRIKE SETTLEMENT EXPECTED

ITALIANS AGREE TO SUBMIT TO ARBITRATION IF PRISONERS ARE RELEASED.

McCloud, Cal., June 5.—Steps were taken today looking to a settlement of the strike at the plant of the McCloud River Lumber company. President John M. Queale agreed to submit the matter in dispute between the company and the striking Italian laborers to an arbitration committee. At a meeting of the strikers it was decided to accept arbitration only on condition that their leaders now under arrest be released and permitted to leave the camp.

With the arrival of Italian Consul General Rocca from San Francisco tomorrow it is believed a settlement of the trouble will be effected quickly. The strikers seem disposed to follow his advice, and the lumber company officials are ready to accept a fair adjustment of the difficulty and resume operations in all departments.


