BRIDGE STEEL SOON TO ARRIVE

ABUTMENT AT SOUTH END OF BRIDGE TO BE FINISHED IN THREE WEEKS.

R. W. Sweet of the Burrell Bridge & Construction company stated yesterday that the steel for the new Higgins avenue bridge should be here within a few days. The manufacturing concern in Toledo has notified him that the cars would be shipped some time between June 1 and June 10, and it is thought that part of the shipment is now on the way to Missoula. In all there will be 45 cars of steel for the new structure.

It was stated yesterday by Superintendent B. A. Grove that the concrete would be placed in the abutment on the south side of the bridge on Tuesday morning, and in about three weeks at the most that part of the bridge will be completed.

TO BUILD NEW BRIDGE AT SANDPOINT

BURRELL BRIDGE & CONSTRUCTION COMPANY GETS CONTRACT FOR CROSSING.

R. W. Sweet of the Burrell Bridge & Construction company stated yesterday that his company had secured the contract for constructing the new county bridge at Sandpoint, Idaho, over Lake Pend d'Oreille, the amount of the company's bid being \$23,000.

This bridge is to be a sort of draw-bridge affair, only instead of the span swinging, it will be lifted bodily, after a design patented by the Waddell & Harrington company of Kansas City. This span will be of steel 81 feet 6 inches in length, and so arranged that the whole span may be raised to allow the passage of traffic underneath. Besides the open span, there will be 2,700 feet of piles in a trestle approach.

Work on the structure will be commenced in two weeks and the contract calls for its completion at the end of four months. R. E. Kubie, chief clerk of the Burrell Bridge & Construction company, will leave for Sandpoint on Monday to get the work in shape for actual construction.

STUDENTS WHO RECEIVED DIPLOMAS FRIDAY HOLD SCHOOL ARSHIP RECORD.


