

MARKET MOVEMENTS OF THE DAY

New York, June 9.—The decisive turn taken by the price movement of stocks today inclined speculative sentiment to take account of unfavorable factors but there was little unfavorable news. The rapid decline in Southern Railway upon the announcement of the much-expected plan to retire the preferred stock was taken as an object lesson of the extent to which favorable developments have been discounted in the speculation. The retirement plan left the private exchange of preferred and common stock the most attractive for preferred stock purchasers and made it highly certain that it would be followed by all the stockholders. Such exchange, it was realized, would leave the company's financial position where it is. An increase in the common dividend raised to 8 per cent showed that the stock purchases at the price touched yesterday, which was 13 1/2 its return would still be less than on Union Pacific at that price and with the dividend already prevailing on the present stock. It was this computation, which involved no new facts, that was responsible for the contrary movement in the Harbison stocks, the most apparent shifting of holdings being from Southern Pacific into Union Pacific. The large benefit to accrue to the Union Pacific treasury from any increase in the Southern Pacific dividend was an additional incentive to this operation. Quite as much influence was exerted on speculative sentiment by the departure for Europe of a stock exchange member credited with an important share in the largest transactions of the recent past in the bull campaign, as by an actual development in conditions bearing on values. This departure was read as a sign that profits had been taken on a large scale in the bull campaign with the conditions to follow of distribution of stocks into weaker hands and a growth of weaker conditions. Bonds were easy. Total sales (par value), \$5,850,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.

Grain and Provisions.

Chicago, June 9.—Wheat was nervous the greater part of the day and the prevailing sentiment was one of bearishness. The heaviness was more noticeable in July than in the more deferred months and was one largely to increased offerings of new wheat to arrive. First trades in wheat for May delivery in 1910 were recorded today, the prices being \$1.10 to \$1.11. During the day July ranged between \$1.18 1/2 and \$1.19 and the close was at \$1.19 1/2. Oats closed firm with prices up 1/4 to 1/2. Provisions were strong all day owing to an active demand by eastern and foreign shippers. The close showed net gains of 1/2 to 3/4.

GENATOR DOLLIVER ASSERTS THAT SUCH AN OCTOPUS HAS BEEN FORMED.

Washington, June 9.—The warden's office was still under consideration in the senate this afternoon when the usual recess for dinner was taken. The committee amendment increasing the house rate on wool to 20 cents per pound to 25 cents per pound was adopted by a vote of 40 to 30. This was a finance committee change and the committee would not usually report on this measure. Senators Gable and Crawford designed the "progressive" but with these exceptions the ranks of that contingent remained unbroken. The committee amendments increasing the duty on shoddy from 20 cents per pound to 25 cents and that on tops from 18 to 20 cents also prevailed.

FOR WOMEN AND THE HOME.

Stain crackers are improved by placing them in a hot oven a few minutes before using. Every knife handle which has become yellow from use may be whitened by being rubbed gently with fine sandpaper and then polished with a clean piece of chamois skin until well polished. Fresh fish will keep over night if wrapped in a cloth well soaked in vinegar. Beef may be kept the same way. Cut flowers will keep a week or so if placed in water in which a small quantity of saltwater has been dissolved. A spoonful of kerosene in boiled starch keeps it from sticking, but do not use enough to make it smelly of the oil. Fruit jars may be preserved from cracking if, before filling, they are placed on a folded towel soaked in hot water. Put a few grains of rice in the salt cellars to keep the salt from caking. As the cellar is shaken the rice keeps the salt moving. Breadcrumbs are used to make puddings with in preference to the usual slice of bread. Crumbs and charcoal mixed into a poultice will cleanse and disinfect sores. Plates and dishes put into an oven or left on the range to warm after crack. water and the sun, wash the face with buttermilk two or three times a day. It has wonderfully soothing properties. The brown streak around the neck, caused by wearing high collars, may be removed by using frequently the juice of cucumbers or by tying thin slices of cucumbers about the neck before retiring. A pretty garnish for cold meat is made by cutting lettuce leaves very finely with a pair of scissors. The strips should be no wider than a blade of grass, and will form a pleasing change from parsley. To clean an enameled bath tub take a heaped tablespoonful of salt, moisten with turpentine and with it scour the bath tub; then rub it with a clean cloth. Before beginning operations take care that the tub is perfectly dry.
