STEAMER STRANDED ON ISLAND

SPANISH VESSEL GROUNDS ON FIRE ISLAND BUT PASSENGERS ARE RESCUED.

New York, June 10.—The Spanish steamer Antonio Lopez, with 326 passengers and a crew of 125 men, grounded on Fire Island last night and lay on the beach all night, pounded by heavy seas. Rockets sent up for assistance warned the summer life saving crew at Point o' Woods life saving station, but they could not do anything until daylight. Early today wrecking tugs reached the stranded steamer. A life boat manned by a volunteer crew of fishermen was launched through the surf and after being thrown back on shore several times by the tremendous waves, succeeded in reaching the stranded steamer. The work of transferring the women and children passengers to the wrecking tugs was then begun. The sea was too high to permit of landing them on shore, and attempts to shoot a life line from shore to set up the breeches buoy were unsuccessful. Later in the day the sea subsided somewhat and several surf boats assisted in removing the passengers to the wrecking tugs. The steamer lies 1,000 feet from shore and appears to be undamaged.

BRILLIANT PAGEANT IS HELD

SPLENDID DISPLAY OF FLOWER FLOATS MARKS PORTLAND ROSE FESTIVAL.

Portland, June 10.—The pageant "Spirit of the Golden West," which annually marks the zenith of the Portland rose festival, occurred tonight and was participated in by an unusually large representation of the cities of Oregon and by Seattle and Hawaii. On the Seattle float, "Exposition City," rode "Queen Leah," daughter of Mayor Miller of Seattle, and her maids of honor. The parade tonight was equal if not superior in beauty and magnificence to the electrical parade Tuesday and was considerably longer and created even more enthusiasm by reason of the fact that the utmost secrecy had prevailed as to the details of the different floats. Fully 250,000 persons witnessed tonight's parade, or about three times the number which turned out to see the decorated vehicle parade this afternoon. In addition to those named there were floats from Corvallis, LaGrande, Pendleton, Vancouver, Wash., Enterprise, Salem, Grant's Pass and Roseburg.

HENEY NOMINATED.
San Francisco, June 10.—Francis J. Heney has been nominated for district attorney by the San Francisco Democratic club, representing one faction of the local democratic party. In expressing his appreciation of the honor conferred, Mr. Heney stated that he would accept the nomination, though in politics he was a Roosevelt republican. The nomination of Heney for the same office is now under consideration by the Municipal League of Republican Clubs.

GOULD DIVORCE CASE ON TRIAL

MRS. GOULD TAKES WITNESS STAND AND TELLS OF HER MARRIED LIFE.

New York, June 10.—It was a smaller and slier Katherine Clemons Gould who took the stand today in her suit for a separation from her husband, Howard Gould, than the public remembered, and her loss in weight was becoming. She seemed nervous at times, under the strain of cross-examination, and when the question led her to the early days of her married life she showed visible emotion, but so far as her husband was concerned, she seemed not to know he was in the same room.

The long-delayed hearing before Justice Dowling is the culmination of a case that began in May, 1907, and had been marked by many sensational accusations of misconduct and attempted subordination of the wretched subordination of witness.

Mrs. Gould alleges that her husband deserted her without just cause on July 16, 1906. Toward Gould answers that his justification was the habits of the plaintiff; that since he left her, he has made her an allowance of \$25,000 a year, but that she is extravagant, intemperate and has been guilty of misconduct.

A Mere Trifle.
The wife asks for an allowance of \$120,000 a year. "During the years that you were living at Castle Gould," asked Clarence S. Hoarn, Mrs. Gould's counsel, "how large an establishment did you have?"

"From 15 to 18 servants in the house, from 10 to 12 around the estate and 18 to 20 gardeners," answered Mrs. Gould.

In answer to questions she rattled off the amounts her husband had allowed her month by month. They averaged about \$10,000. She kept two bank accounts—one a Mrs. Howard Gould account and one a Katherine Gould account.

"In the eight years of the Howard Gould account, I find," said Delancy Neeff, counsel for the husband, "that it totals \$775,980. Is that correct?"

"I think so."

"Mr. Gould says that in all those years he paid you \$776,000."

"I gave him credit for more," was the inartistic comment.

Mr. Neeff tried to bring out discrepancies in various statements of expenditures. He recited off a long list of figures and dates, Mrs. Gould listening patiently. At the end she said:

"What are you talking about?"

Counsel caught his breath and tried another avenue of attack.

"Did you know that at the time of the separation there were bills for \$120,000 outstanding against you?"

"I haven't the slightest idea."

Varies Answers.
Mrs. Gould varied her answers when asked if her expenditures at Castle Gould included any liquors.

"Yes," she said, "everything. I bought the apples, onions, potatoes, vinegar, sugar, salt, flour, horse feed and chicken feed. I traveled all over the country selecting materials."

She told with evident relish of the magnificent yacht Niagara, with its crew of 80 men, its saloon with seats for 60 guests and decorations that in one room alone cost \$52,000.

More recent events, touched on later in the day, she could not recall. She could not recall having seen Dustin Farnum, the actor, whose name figured in an affidavit introduced as evidence in 1908 or 1909, but she was positive she had not seen him within a month.

Details of money in her own name and how she came to own a farm in Virginia were hard to elicit, and the witness began to show signs of being tired and even of some temper. The day closed with her still on the stand and smiling sweetly, as court adjourned.

DATE FOR HEARING OF SUIT IS NAMED

Helena, June 10.—In the United States court today, Judge Hunt fixed June 21, as the date for the trial of the suit of the St. Louis Mining company against the Montana Mining company, limited, operating in the Marysville district of this county. Damages upwards of \$1,000,000 are sought for ore alleged to have been illegally extracted from what is known as the disputed vein.

It was while in Washington to argue one phase thereof that Senator Brown of Utah was shot by Mrs. Bradley of Salt Lake City. The Rothchilds of London are the principal owners of the Montana company, which produced \$35,000,000 and the territory in dispute contains a vast amount of exceptionally rich gold ore, which for years was guarded by riflemen on either side.

WILL TAKE CHARGE OF NAVAL STATION

Victoria, B. C., June 10.—The Dominion government is to take over the Esquimalt naval station from the imperial government and Rear Admiral Kingsmill, head of the Canadian navy, after completing his inspection of the buildings, equipment, etc., of the naval yard will leave for Ottawa tonight to make his report to the government. The station will be formally taken over after his report is submitted. The naval yard will be used as the headquarters in British Columbia for the lighthouse and fisheries protection services, and the wharves to be brought from Great Britain as a training ship and fishery cruiser. Pending purchase of this vessel the Dominion government has chartered the salvage tug William Johnstone to aid the fishery protection cruiser Kestrel, beginning at once.

ORDERS REDUCTION OF THE JUDGMENT

Helena, June 10.—Holding that the damages awarded Mrs. E. D. Yerry against the Helena Light & Railroad company for the death of her husband who was run down by a Helena street car a year ago, to be excessive, the supreme court today cut the award from \$40,000 to \$15,000. Unless this reduction is accepted within 30 days a new trial is ordered. This is the largest sum ever awarded in Montana for personal injuries. COAL WAR IS ON.

San Francisco, June 10.—A cut rate war between local wholesale coal houses is on, as a result of a cut in prices made by a local firm in order to get rid of a surplus of Australian coal. Several firms, having no large surplus on hand, have telegraphed orders for large shipments and the first headquarters in British Columbia for the cut to \$7.75 has been followed by a cut to \$7.50, and other dealers are preparing to reduce rates.

PLANS NOT ABANDONED.

Washington, June 10.—The fact that the advocates of the income tax amendment have rejected suggestions that a tax be placed on dividends of corporations has not resulted in the abandonment of such a plan. The supporters of an income tax have gained a following that makes them a formidable force and therefore no possible basis of a substitute committee compromise is being overlooked.
