NOTES OF WALLACE

Wallace, June 11.—A 500-foot shaft is being sunk on the Southern cross property at Pottsville, near Mullian, and is down 40 feet. Assays of ore at the grass roots give 5 per cent lead. Governor Norris of Montana and several prominent cattlemen of Montana are the main stockholders.

B. F. O'Neil, chairman of the state republican committee and president of the Idaho Northern railroad, holds the record for black bass of this season in the district, landing a six and a half pound bass during his visit at Harrison for the train.

A party of Oshkosh, Wis., business men will arrive here Thursday to inspect mines of the district. They will later continue to Seattle to visit the exposition.

The Goldback property near Murray has been bonded by eastern capitalists who will take up further development at Pottsville. The amount of the bond is said to be \$200,000, though the owners of the property refuse to state the amount at present. A perpendicular shaft will be sunk to a depth of 600 feet and drifting on the ledge at that depth begun.

Wallace, June 11.—A record unusual in its way has been made at the Josephine mine, near Sattese, by the contractors, Arthur Olson and Peter Kain in 40 days they put in a galvanized frame, hoist, engine room, got out timber from the woods, built cables, sunk 100 feet of double compartment shaft, timbered it completely and put in the ladders.

With the closing by the commissioners of the city dump east of Wallace it will be necessary to install a crematory or rubbish-destroying plant to take care of the refuse from the city. Otherwise it would be necessary to haul all rubbish two miles east to Lake gulch.

The Midway-Summit mine, located near Mullian, has ordered a compressor plant and other machinery, which is expected to be installed July 1. An 1,800-foot crosscut tunnel will then be driven. Fine galena has been exposed in the upper workings.

The first car of ore shipped from the H. E. M. mine was tested at the sampling works of the Federal company here and gave return of 17 per cent in lead and 20 ounces in silver. Regular shipments will be made as soon as the ore is blocked out.

The Odd Fellows of Wallace will hold the annual Memorial day exercises of the order on Sunday with services at the Odd Fellows' cemetery. A special train will be run from here to the cemetery for the occasion.

For the first time in the history of Wallace the union men have a good hall in which they can meet and spend their leisure time. A reading room and card room have been opened in connection with the hall for meeting.

The cooks and waiters' local has opened the hall and extended a welcome to all union men. The secretary of the cooks and waiters' local is in active charge and is paid the union salary to remain in the hall all day.

Over 200 pioneers, the men who made the Coueur d'Alenes, will convene in Wallace in August on Pioneer day, the first celebration of the occasion since one was struck in the state. Eagle City, the birthplace of the Coueur d'Alenes, will be the site of the festival and the big barbecue. Senator W. B. Heyburn, who was one of the early settlers, will be the guest of honor.

INSPECTION ORDERED. Washington, June 11.—With the approval of the secretary of war, Surgeon General Torney has ordered the officers of the medical department to make a thorough inspection of each military post of the army in order to see if any action is necessary to improve their condition from a purely sanitary standpoint.

BAPTIST PREACHER ORDERED TO DEPART

Lagos, British West Africa, June 11.—Rev. S. M. Pinnock, a missionary of the foreign missions board of the South Baptist convention, has been expelled from the town of Oyo, in Nigeria. The native chief of Oyo ordered Mr. Pinnock to leave last April, but the missionary refused to comply. He appealed to the British governor of the province but this officer declined to interfere. The chief complains that Mr. Pinnock has refused to recognize his authority.

Oyo is located 120 miles northeast of Lagos.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 9.—A case of leprosy was found in this city yesterday. Dr. H. B. Tabbetts, assistant health officer, had been called to Northier street to make an examination of a case of measles which had been reported to the health office, when he found a Mexican, Adelaide Aguirre, suffering from a well developed case of leprosy.

The Mexican claims to have made Los Angeles his home for the last five years and for two years he has been in such condition as to be unable to work.
