## PETITION REQUESTS PLEADS FOR BETTER RURAL ROUTE LAWS

FORMULATED DEMANDS OF PEOPLE ON NEW ROAD GOES TO WASHINGTON.

Hamilton, June 11.—Postmaster C. C. Chaffin has been presented with a petition asking for a new rural delivery route to cover the country along the new road between Hamilton and Sleeping Child creek. The postmaster has forwarded the petition to Washington and speedy action by the postal authorities is hoped for.

The great influx of new residents from the east has done its share towards increasing the business of the local postoffice, while the normal growth of the valley has been felt in the volume of business handled by Postmaster Chaffin and his assistants. It is said that there is probably not a town in the country of the size of Hamilton in which the postoffice handles such a tremendous load of mail. The recent decision of Postmaster General Hitchcock to raise the Hamilton office from the third to the second class, as announced in The Missoulian on June 5, shows that the business of the department has increased greatly locally. Postmaster Chaffin will receive an increase in salary from \$1,700 to \$2,000, the largest granted to any in the state of Montana, in which 22 postmasters were named for higher pay. The new order of things in the Hamilton postoffice becomes effective on July 1.

EPISCOPALIANS ADOPT A STRONG RESOLUTION ON NATIONAL AFFAIRS.

Newport, Ky., June 11.—The Episcopal diocesan assembly of the Lexington diocese in conference here for four days adopted the following resolution dealing with the present economic conditions of the country:

"Whereas, we the Protestant Episcopal church in the diocese of Lexington, being a branch of God's church and assembled in council, feel deep concern over conditions created and being perpetuated by alarming, if not revolutionary, legislation, whereby the necessities of the lives of the needy are disproportionately taxed, and

"Whereas, such legislation is fast destroying men's reverence for law and so leading to anarchy; therefore, we, members of the council aforesaid, conscious of the trust of righteousness committed by the triune God to plead with all controlling forces of our land—senatorial, congressional, legislative and executive to give us laws right in the sight of God, just and true to all the people, call upon every Christian organization in the land to join us in this purpose and pleading."

## WILL INVESTIGATE CONDITIONS

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE WILL LOOK INTO STOCK YARD AFFAIRS.

Washington, June 11.—The department of agriculture today accepted the challenge of J. F. Harms, a government meat inspector at St. Louis, who, in tendering his resignation to the department, made serious charges against the meat inspection system at the National stock yards in East St. Louis, and demanded an investigation relative to his allegations. An immediate and thorough investigation concerning the charge of Mr. Harms was today ordered, and to that end two government inspectors have been ordered there. When they have completed their investigations the facts developed will be reported to Secretary Wilson.

The letter of Inspector Harms to the secretary making the charges and demanding an investigation has been received, but the resignation has not yet reached here. It was stated, however, that it would be accepted immediately upon its receipt.

Dr. Alonzo Melville, chief of the department of animal industry, under whose supervision the meat inspection service comes, will prepare a statement today, showing the conditions in the East St. Louis stock yards.
