FINAL REPORT MADE BY SHARNIKOW

ADMINISTRATOR OF HIGGINS ESTATE APPEARS WITH ATTORNEY BEFORE COURT.

Yesterday A. Sharnikow, administrator of the Higgins estate, filed his final account in the district court, showing that the estate is worth half a million dollars, and an order of distribution will be made within the next 30 or 60 days. Mr. Sharnikow, with his attorneys, Charles H. Hall and John E. Patterson, appeared before Judge Myers in the district court early yesterday afternoon and presented his final report, which was accepted. The report showed all expenditures and all of the business deals of the estate since it was placed in the hands of the administrator.

The court complimented the administrator and the attorneys of the estate in the highest terms for their capable, business-like management of the fortune entrusted to their care and for establishing the estate on a sound cash basis. It was announced last evening that an order of distribution would be made within a short time; after the five heirs have received their share, the administrator will be discharged and the Higgins estate will have become a memory.

BISON HERD READY FOR SHIPMENT

ALLARD BUFFALOES ARE SOON TO START ON LONG TRIP TO CANADIAN PARK.

Yesterday for the second time in its history the Flathead buffalo herd was rounded up and started on its last journey over its native soil. For weeks Canadian cowboys have been busy collecting the giant herd, 225 in all, at Roman preparatory to shipment and yesterday the bison were started on their way in crates on wagons to Ravalli, where the special train which is to carry them to Canada is waiting.

Last fall an attempt was made to get the herd off but the buffalo proved too wild and made their escape from the carefully constructed corrals, which was thought escape proof, climbing up an almost perpendicular cliff. This time, however, every possible method of escape has been barred and so far things are running smoothly.

The herd, which is the largest in the world, is to be sent, for the most part, to Canada, where it is to be put in the Banff National park, while a few of them will go to parks in the eastern part of the United States. The Canadian cowboys, who have been sent here by the colonial government for the purpose, have been hard at work for some months collecting the buffaloes and have at last gotten them together at Roman. There they are being loaded into wagons in crates one or two being taken at a time and put on the cars, which are waiting for them at Ravalli. The Northern Pacific has gotten together a special train for the animals, all of them fixed so that they cannot injure themselves or make their escape in any way and the shipment will be made just as soon as possible.

COLORADO STUDENTS TRAVEL THROUGH WEST

Herman Weinberger, a student at the University of Colorado, arrived in Missoula yesterday. He is one of 37 students who started out from Boulder at the close of the school year to work through Colorado, Wyoming, Montana, Arizona and New Mexico in the interests of "Honor Camp," a study game warden, left this morning for Inoué to be present at the finals of the roundup.

MAKING A VOLCANO COOK.

At the very edge of the great crater of the volcano of Kilauea, on the island of Hawaii, about 200 miles from Honolulu, is located one of the most novel ventures of the season. Its owner is an American and he is making a profitable business from the so-called occupation of raising swine; but the remarkable feature in these farming operations is the manner of feeding the stock.

Covering the slopes of this crater mountain and entirely surrounding the ranch is a dense forest, a greater part of whose undergrowth is composed of giant tree ferns. That variety of vegetation often rises to a height of 50 feet, with wonderful feathery foliage and stems, frequently a foot or more in diameter. The hard, shell-like covering to these trunks encloses a fibrous mass consisting principally of a pulp rich in starches and sugars. Experiments demonstrated that after thoroughly steaming or cooking this pulp it becomes soft and is greedily eaten by the hogs, but the method of preparing the fodder was too expensive for practical purposes. However, the natural resources of Hawaii solved the problem.

The hardened lava coating, which extends for a considerable distance on every side of the active central pit of the volcano, is cracked in many places, allowing steam to escape continuously. At these points the value of these phenomena, and above several of the fissures gridirons were erected and cordwood lengths of fern trunks piled upon them. The effectiveness of this primitive steam-cooker was immediately apparent, and in the course of one or two days the toughest fern became tender under this treatment. A single stroke with an axe then sufficed to split open each stem and laid bare the nutritious pulp, which the swine eagerly devoured.—Harper's Weekly.

START DAILY TRAIN SERVICE

PUGET SOUND RAILROAD TO RUN FREIGHT OVER DIVISION EVERY DAY.

It was announced yesterday by local Puget Sound officials that a daily freight service would be installed on the division, beginning with next week to take the place of the tri-weekly train which was started last month. This tri-weekly train has proved a decided success and the business which has grown out of it has developed to an extent which makes a daily train necessary. The new train will run on the same schedule as the present one, leaving Deer Lodge in the morning and arriving here at 6 o'clock and at the other end of the division at 8 o'clock. This train will handle all local freight on the division and will stop at all stations on the line. A passenger coach will also be attached for the use of the employees of the company.

The water in the river having receded sufficiently, work was started yesterday on the task of pulling out of the river the engine which went through bridge No. 1 last month. The job was finished yesterday. The accident occurred nearly a month ago when the river was at its highest. The nose end of the long bridge is only a temporary pile structure and the wrecked engine went through it when it was weakened by the flooded river. The train was moving slowly, however, and the tender remained on the track, leaving only the nose of the engine in the stream. At the time the water was thought too high to pull the engine out and a "shoo-fly" track was built around it and it was left there. Yesterday, however, the work was done and a track was built from the bridge proper down into the water under the engine and the big locomotive was pulled from its dangerous position.

Official confirmation of the fact that three young Milwaukee surveyors, Andrew Parker, C. A. Kacey and W. P. Powell, had been drowned while attempting to cross the North Fork is found in the Kalispell Bee. According to the Bee the men were attempting to cross the river on a raft while the water was high. When in the middle the raft collapsed and the young men were thrown into the stream, all of them drowning before reaching shore. Two engineers in the employ of the railroad were near the men when the accident occurred, but owing to the softness of the water, they were unable to reach them in time to even rescue their bodies. One of the young men was a Montana boy, the son of H. W. Parker of the Parker Lumber company of Columbia Falls, while the other two were from the east. A searching party has been formed and the river is being dragged, but up to date no traces of the bodies have been found.


