## WATER SYSTEM MAY BE REBUILT

NEWLY ACQUIRED PROPERTY OF DALY ESTATE WILL BE IMPROVED OR SOLD.

Hamilton, June 18.—P. J. Shannon stated yesterday that the sale of the Townsite property, the electric light plant and the waterworks system took effect April 1, but that the Hotel Ravalli would not be turned over to the Daly estate until July 1.

A special department will be fitted up in the Valley Mercantile company's store to handle the business previously done by Mr. Dudley and Mr. Tyler of the Anaconda Copper Mining company. In regard to the waterworks system, Mr. Shannon asserted that unless the system was sold to the city work would be begun as soon as possible to double the size of the plant, so as to furnish the entire city with an abundant supply of water.

## GEORGE L. AMBROSE IS COMING BACK

FORMER RESIDENT WILL LOCATE IN MISSOULA TO PRACTICE HIS PROFESSION.

Last week The Missoulian, in its Washington correspondence, announced the graduation of George L. Ambrose, a former resident of this city, from the George Washington university of Washington, D. C., from which institution he received the degree of bachelor of laws. Following this comes the announcement that young Mr. Ambrose will locate in Missoula for the practice of his profession. He is returning to Montana to remain permanently. After he has finished some important work for the government in western Montana he will hang out his shingle in the Garden City, making a specialty of irrigation and public land law.

It will be remembered that Mr. Ambrose was president of the Young Men's Republican club of Missoula during the last Roosevelt campaign. At the close of the campaign he was appointed by State Senator Donkin as clerk of the senate printing committee and served in that capacity during the legislative session of 1926, after which United States Senator Dixon appointed him to a clerkship in the library of congress in Washington, where he remained for two years. He then took an examination under civil service regulations and was made a law writer in the general land office. Last summer he was special agent in the general land office of Montana, working in the Missoula and Great Falls districts.

## EXPORT BUSINESS WILL SHOW DECLINE

Washington, June 18.—A statement issued today by the bureau of statistics says that "It is now apparent that the exports from the United States in the fiscal year will fall below those of 1928 and 1927, and slightly below those of 1926."

The total value of domestic merchandise exported in 1928 was \$1,835,000,000; in 1927, \$1,854,000,000, and in 1926, \$1,718,000,000. The bureau estimates that the domestic exports for the full fiscal year 1929 will be nearly \$200,000,000 below 1928 and 1927, and perhaps \$50,000,000 below those of 1926.
