## EARLING GOES EAST THIS AFTERNOON

PRESIDENT OF C. M. & ST. P. WILL PASS THROUGH MISSOULA ON WAY HOME.

Today President H. J. Earling of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, will pass through Missoula on his way back to Chicago after a visit on the coast of a couple of weeks. Construction Trainmaster C. H. Marshall left on Thursday for Hangan, and he will return this afternoon with Mr. Earling. The western end of the extension has practically opened up during the president's trip, a daylight passenger and freight schedule having been established and with the installing of through freight service over the entire road. The special bearing the party is running a little behind the schedule and had not been received by the division last night, so that the time of its arrival could not be definitely set. It will get in sometime during the evening and may spend the night here.

This morning will mark the inauguration of the first real opening of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, and when the first through freight starts on its journey today the eastern and western ends of the new extension will have been connected by a schedule train for the first time. The new train will carry only revenue freight and will be put through on the fastest schedule possible, the same train being run over the whole road. No definite time table has been set as yet, but there will be a through train every day over the line handling through freight only, and stopping only at the more important towns along the road. Missoula freight will probably be handled by this train and all through freight for points along the line will be handled by it as far as Missoula, but local freight and company freight will be left alone and will be handled by the supply trains.

## METROPOLITAN LAW HELD TO PREVAIL

Livingston, June 18.—In the district court today Judge Henry handed down a decision in the police cases in which he holds that the metropolitan police law applies to the city of Livingston and that Policemen Murphy and Frazier, appointees under Mayor Goughner, will continue on the force. In the case of Policeman Vaupel, the court holds that he is beyond the age limit and cannot serve. This gives Policeman Louis Hansen the place declared vacant by the court.  
Immediately after Mayor Schuber was installed into office he appointed a new force. The appointees under Mayor Goughner refused to relinquish their positions and as a result it was necessary to commence proceedings against them. In the case of the chief of police, J. H. King, resigned, the case did not come before the court.

## LAND OFFICE MAKES RULING

FULL EXPLANATION IS MADE OF PARAGRAPH 41 OF MINING REGULATIONS.

Register Daniel Arms of the Missoula land office yesterday received a letter from Fred Bennett, commissioner of the general land office at Washington, which is considered of great importance to mining people and those who may wish to enter on mining claims. It is as follows:  
"The attention of the department has been called to the last clause of paragraph 41 of the mining regulations, approved March 29, 1909, which provides as follows:  
"The vein or lode must be fully described, the description to include a statement as to the kind and character of mineral, the extent thereof, whether ore has been extracted, and what amount and value and such other facts as will support the applicant's allegation that the claim contains a valuable mineral deposit."  
"It seems that the expression, 'the extent thereof,' is being construed as meaning that the applicant must affirmatively show by proof of exploration that the vein exists in fact throughout the whole length of the claim."  
"This construction of the paragraph is erroneous. By the words quoted it was intended to require the claimant to show the existence of a vein in such workings as he relied on to establish a discovery. By the extent of the vein was meant its size and quality as disclosed. That being done, the presumption exists that the vein extends on its strike throughout the whole length of the claim as located."  
"The sole purpose of that part of paragraph 41 quoted was to enable the land department to know, so far as applicant can reasonably show, the definite facts upon which the right to the patent is predicated, so as to determine whether a valuable mineral deposit exists in the land claimed."

ANY PERSON MAY ACT AS AGENT  
QUALIFICATIONS ARE MADE PUBLIC AS TO WHO MAY REGISTER FOR SOLDIERS.

More particulars in regard to registration for the reservation lands were received of the Missoula land office, received of the Missoula land office. The latest information refers to the qualifications which may entitle an agent to act for former soldiers. The letter, signed by James Witten, superintendent of the opening, states that many inquiries have been received in the Washington office from people in this district, and the letter is sent out as an answer to these inquiries.  
It is stated that any person, married or single, male or female, may act as agent for former soldiers, providing that the person is over the age of 21 and possesses a power of attorney duly executed. No person can act as agent for more than one soldier at any registration point, but the same agent may register for the same or different soldiers for each of the three reservations, by a separate power of attorney is required for each registration.
