CHEVROLET CAPTURES COBE CUP

WINS BIG EVENT WITH A BUICK FORTY HORSE-POWER IN A DESPERATE FINISH.

Crown Point, Ind., June 19.—A Buick 40-horsepower car, driven by Louis Chevrolet won the Kobe cup, the major event in the "Western Vanderbilt" race over the 295.65 miles of the Crown Point-Lowell course, today by the hair-raising margin of one minute and five seconds. Bourque, in a Knox, who was second, made so desperate a bid for victory that not until the winning machine flashed over the tape was the result at all certain.

Owing to the fact that Chevrolet was the tenth entrant in a field of 12 and that Bourque crowded so perilously close to him in the final laps, the Knox car, No. 2 on the list, was the first to pass the tape, his time being 8:52:44. At this time Chevrolet was somewhere near the beginning of the long south stretch with eight minutes in which to secure the prize. As he flashed by the stations along this part of the course, the news of his location, transmitted by wire to the judges' stand and through the watchers, wrought them to a climax of enthusiasm. The intense anxiety regarding the movements to the last foot was due in the main to a lively sense of the possibility of a disaster involved by a multitude of rough experiences characterizing the day. Chevrolet's total distance was 395.65 miles. Average time, 49:26 miles an hour. Fastest lap, 22:34, by Denison with a Knox.

In the eleventh mile Chevrolet broke a valve in a cylinder in such a manner that it could not be repaired, and he was forced to run the rest of the day with three cylinders, which made his performance all the more remarkable. To offset this misfortune, in a measure, the superior skill with which he and his machinist handled the oil cans during a stop at the repairing pits, saved a high time of immense value later in the day.

The race, which showed an average of 49.26 miles an hour, was unusually slow for cars of the 60-horsepower class.

NEW BANTAMWEIGHT CHAMPION

MONTE ATTELL KNOCKS OUT FRANKIE NEIL FIFTEENTH ROUND

Arena, San Francisco, June 19.—Monte Attell knocked out Frankie Neil in the eighteenth round of a scheduled 20-round battle at the Crocker arena late afternoon. The contest was for the bantamweight championship of the United States. From the sixth round to the tenth the fight was fairly even, with Neil the aggressor, although Attell landed oftener and cleaner. In the eighth Neil planted a solid left to the pit of the stomach, staggering Attell.

Neil was the aggressor throughout and he forced Attell to break ground time and time again. His punches lacked their old-time force, however, and in only two rounds did he appear to have a chance with the brother of the featherweight champion. Attell had everything. He peppered Neil's nose and mouth with straight lefts, jaw and occasionally rapped Frankie in the midsection with a solid right or left.

BASE BALL MAGNATE DIES VERY SUDDENLY

Xenia, Ohio, June 19.—George Dovey, president of the Boston National league baseball club, died on a Pennsylvania railroad train between Cedarville and Xenia early today, following a hemorrhage of the lungs. Mr. Dovey was on his way to Cincinnati, unaccompanied. He was 46 years old. No National league games will be played on the day of the funeral.

Yesterday a Busy Day.
Pittsburg, June 19.—The sudden death of George Dovey caused a surprise in this city, as he spent yesterday here holding a conference at the Hotel Schenley with President Droyfus and Secretary Locke of the Pittsburg National baseball club. Mr. Dovey left here yesterday afternoon for Steubenville, Ohio, where he was to look over promising baseball players, and then intended to go to Cincinnati. He was apparently in the best of health.
