MISSOULA TO VISIT GOOD ROADS WORK TO CONTINUE

GARDEN CITY SENDS A LARGE CROWD DOWN VALLEY FOR ST. JOHN'S DAY

Several hundred residents, headed by the Missoula band, will leave this morning on a special train for Frenchtown, to be present at the annual celebration of St. John's day by the people of the valley town. Three coaches will be provided for the contingent, which will join forces with the delegations from Anaconda and Butte. The special train, bringing the visitors from other portions of the state, will pull out of the local depot at 9:45 after three coaches have been added to it for the Missoula crowd. Among those who will make the trip will be several athletes of local reputation, who expect to enter the various sporting events on the program for St. John's day. It is thought that more Missoula people will visit Frenchtown today than have ever attended any previous observation of the Canadian national holiday. Frenchtown has made elaborate preparations for the entertaining of many visitors and the program of the day is rich in things enjoyable. The lists of sports includes an automobile race from Missoula to Frenchtown, a bicycle race over the same course, the usual running events, the mile vault, running and broad jumps, horse bucking contest, horse races, ball game, tug-of-war and band concerts and a ball with fire out the day.

AUTOMOBILE CLUB WILL KEEP UP ITS CAMPAIGN FOR SMOOTHER HIGHWAYS.

That the work of improving the public highways in the vicinity of Missoula should be kept up was the decision made last evening by local automobile enthusiasts, at a meeting of the Missoula county automobile club. The presents received by the newly-married last evening included much that was valuable in the way of jewelry, silverware and furniture, but the most elaborate gift was a check for \$500, presented by the groom's father, who is the manager of the Hawthorne club.

Mrs. Johnson is the daughter of R. J. Lucas, who runs a horseback stand near the Shagard hotel. She has been prominent in colored society and is one of the most attractive of the dark-skinned girls of Missoula.
