HOLD A CONFERENCE WITH GOVERNOR

LEADERS IN HAWAIIAN STRIKE ASSURE EXECUTIVE THAT MEN ARE PEACEFUL.

Honolulu, June 25.—M. Makino and M. Negoro, two of the political leaders of the Japanese in the strike of the plantation laborers and both of whom are under indictment charging conspiracy to incite murder and riot, called upon Governor Frear today to discuss the strike situation in the islands. Following the conference Governor Frear in an interview said: "The two Japanese leaders called to assure me that the strikers are peaceably inclined, have no intention of causing disturbance or disorder and that they are engaged in a peaceable movement to secure the same wages for the Japanese as are paid to laborers of other nationalities. They also complained of the seizure of their papers by the high sheriff, claiming that the act was a violation of their treaty rights and wished to see me to learn what I could do to see that they were fairly treated. They also declared that the cases of the leaders who were arrested were being unduly rushed in the courts, giving them no time to prepare their case. "I informed them that I was keeping in close touch with events in the islands and would continue to do so but that they must realize that I could not do anything that would interfere with the judiciary."
