**STOCKS SHOW STATE OF STAGNATION**

NORMAL TENDENCY OF SEASON IS EMPHASIZED BY ADDITIONAL CIRCUMSTANCES.

New York, June 28.—The period around July 1st is one, traditionally of quiet stock trading. This normal tendency was emphasized today by several additional circumstances which combined to throw the market into a state of stagnation not approached for many months. After the first hour the market was practically idle. Advice were favorable regarding the winter wheat harvest, but some complaints were heard about the cotton prospects. The tariff bill in entering the final stages gives promise of a desired consumption, although the speculation and the march of business have gone forward so effectively without waiting for the termination of the tariff struggle some question arose as to the course of the speculation as to enactment of the law. Confidence is unimpaired that the July money settlements will offer no factor of disturbance and money markets remained in the soft and yielding state that has characterized them for some time past. Engagements of \$2,000,000 gold today for shipment to Europe was in spite of a show of growing abundance of money in foreign markets, which lowered the discount rate today in London and Berlin. Shipments of gold going out from New York are a measure of relief from a prothoric money market, due to the excess of the inflow of money from the interior over the outgo by gold exports, the amount of the latter since the first of January having risen slightly over \$60,000,000, while the excess of receipts from the interior over shipments in that time is estimated at no less than \$100,000,000.

The promise of the continued money abundance is a strong factor in keeping alive expectation of future speculative activity. The Washab deal and the anthracite holding companies were made to do new duty in the day's merger speculation but only languid interest was aroused.

Bonds were steady. Total sales, (par value), \$4,647,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.

**Chicago Grain and Provisions.**

Chicago, June 28.—Domestic conditions again dominated in the wheat market as nearly as reports today told of the steady advance of harvest and claimed generally good yields, sentiment was bearish. The feature of the trading was liberal sales by two of the leading cash interests, which selling was based in all probability on the increased offerings of new wheat. An advance of 1/2c to 3/4c at Liverpool due, it was said, to bullish advice regarding the wheat crop of France and Argentina caused firmness at the start, but before the end of the first half hour sentiment became increasingly bearish. Improved harvesting weather inspired selling and the weather here predicted better weather. The range on July was between \$1.14 1/2 and \$1.16 1/2. The market closed weak, with prices from 1/4 to 1/2c above the low point. Final figures for July were \$1.15.

The corn market in general was weak, the closing being near the bottom. Prices were 1/2c below Saturday's figures.

Oats followed the downward trend being subjected to general selling. The close was weak with prices 3/4 to 1/2c below the previous close.

Provisions were weak all day and closed unchanged at 23 1/2c lower.

**WOULD SAVE WOMAN FROM PRISON TERM**

Washington, June 28.—Executive clemency to save a young woman from the disgrace of a term in prison was sought at the White House by Representative Mondell of Wyoming today for Mrs. Mabel Donovan, until recently postmistress at Delta, Wyo. Mrs. Donovan, who is only 26 years old, was convicted of embezzlement in connection with the issuance of money orders and was shortly to be taken to Denver, Col. to serve six months in jail. Mr. Mondell brought documents to show that eight of the jurors who had found her guilty have since declared their belief that the woman had no intention of committing a crime.

Her case was referred to the department of justice.

**RADICAL SENATOR**

Washington, June 28.—Senator McCumber has taken a stand against more than one member of a family holding government positions. This is decidedly revolutionary and has created much excitement. His speech outlining his views was delivered in the senate this week and had the effect of causing an investigation of many persons. There is a provision covering this in the civil service regulations and Secretary Nagel of commerce and labor has ordered an inquiry in his department.

Berlin, June 28.—Professor Earnest von Halle, the political economist, died here today of puerility. He was born in 1828. Professor Halle was well known in the United States. He wrote various studies on cotton culture in the south on the enterprise of Germans in America and economic questions in the West Indies and Venezuela.

The professor was an ardent advocate of the German navy and aided in the preparation of several naval bills.

The attention of all builders and contractors is directed to the following, which is an exact copy of article 11, section 3, of the International constitution and by-laws of the Bricklayers' and Masons' union:

"The setting, setting and pointing of all cement blocks or artificial stonework and all cement work, the building of party walls, columns, girders, beams, floors, stairs, arches and plaster-back partitions, where substituted for brick, shall be done by bricklayers and where substituted for stone, shall be done by stonemasons. This refers to all concrete foundations and all retaining walls."
