CONVICTED GAMBLER MUST SERVE

INDICATIONS ARE THAT JOHN RADMILOVICH WILL GO TO PRISON FOR YEAR.

Butte, June 28.—It looks very much as if John Radmilovich, who once ased his family troubles in Missoula county before the district court, will have to serve out his full year in jail. This morning his attorneys applied for a stay of execution and the request was denied. A stay of proceedings was also denied although leave was granted to prepare a bill of exceptions. Tomorrow a hearing will be held upon an application to have the defendant released upon bond pending an appeal. Reports about the court have it that Radmilovich's attorneys have let their case go by the board by not filing the motion form of a notice for a new trial or an appeal sooner and they have lost standing in the supreme court save as far as the record goes, which is absolutely straight and contains no flaws. So it looks very much as if Radmilovich will be one of the violators of the gambling law who will stay in jail for the full year, as no changes were made in the information which he was tried.

According to several of the lawyers who happened to be in court this morning Mr. Radmilovich is rather up against it, as the motion for a new trial in days after the verdict, as the law provides. This will, it is asserted by the county attorney and others present the review of the evidence by the supreme court, and it is upon this that the attorney for Radmilovich is quite without a chance of freedom except at the end of his sentence.

DEVELOPMENT COMPANY ATTEMPTS TO RECOVER

Helena, June 28.—Suit has been brought in the district court by the Western Development company against E. A. Hall to recover \$4,800, and for the restoration of books and accounts which it alleges the defendant has in his possession. Some time ago Hall brought suit against the company to recover \$40,000, which he alleged the company owes him for services rendered. The company built the Yellowstone Park railway in Carbon county, and Hall acted as its agent. The suit for the cash is based on the allegation that Hall made false returns on the amounts expended to the total demanded.

JUDGMENT AFFIRMED BY BRANTLY

CHIEF JUSTICE GIVES DECISION UPHOLDING LOWER COURT IN FOSTER CASE.

Helena, June 28.—The supreme court today in an opinion written by Chief Justice Brantly affirmed the judgment of the lower court of Silver Bow county, which found that the acts of E. A. Winstanley of Missoula in connection with his agency for owners of mining property in Butte were fraudulent. The suit was brought by Emma Foster and her children against Winstanley and two others to have the court rescind a sale made by Winstanley to his co-defendants of a one-sixth interest in the Dead Wood quartz claim in Silver Bow county. According to the finding of the lower court Winstanley, while acting as agent for the Fosters, who are not residents of Montana, sold the property for \$2,500 and refuted to the owners \$1,000. There was paid on the transaction \$1,500, and the court ordered that the plaintiffs pay that sum to the purchasers from Winstanley, and that they recover from Winstanley \$500, retained by him out of the payment made to him, with interest, and that on the payment to the purchasers of the \$1,000 the deed to the property be cancelled and the sixth interest restored to the plaintiffs.
