**APPLE SHOW PLANS DISCUSSED**

CONFERENCE IS HELD BY PRESIDENT ALLEN AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

There was a conference last night at the chamber of commerce rooms between the members of the executive committee and President Allen of the Fair association, relative to the plans for the apple show, which is to be held here this fall, the dates having been announced as October 18 to 22, inclusive.

Mr. Allen spoke briefly in review of the work that has been done already and set forth what he considered the lasting benefits that will come to Missoula as a result of the show being held here. These benefits, however, are not all Missoula's; they will be shared as they should, by the Bitter Root, Plains and Thompson valleys, where there is fruit raised.

There was unanimous agreement with Mr. Allen's remarks and there ensued a detailed discussion as to the plan to be followed in making the apple show a complete success. As an outcome of this discussion, the chamber of commerce guaranteed to assume the financial responsibility of the apple show, supplementary to the thousand dollars which the county commissioners have already donated to the fund.

Secretary Ebert of the chamber of commerce is to be the secretary of the apple show, and he was last night authorized to employ a clerk to assist him in the work, his time to be divided at present between the heavy business incidental to the reservation opening and the preparations for the fair. Mr. Ebert, after the meeting, announced the selection of William G. Ferguson as his assistant and he will enter upon his new duties this morning. In the meantime, it is up to the business men to get together the funds necessary to carry out the plans for the show.

Manager Harpols will give up the use of the Union theater to the apple show for a week, and this big hall will be divided into booths and stalls and there will be the best and biggest display of Montana apples ever made. There was no dissent last night and the details of the plans will be announced in a few days. Mr. Allen thanked the chamber of commerce and promised them a good fair.

**INCORPORATION PAPERS FILED FOR NEW ROAD**

Articles of incorporation were filed in the office of the clerk of the district court yesterday for the Missoula, Belt Railway company, which has a listed capital stock of \$25,000. George P. Smith, Susan O. Smith and Dr. Joseph Oettinger are named as the directors of the new company and the stock is declared to be divided into 250 shares of \$100 each. It is understood that the new road is merely to include all the Junction track and sidings which the Missoula Gas company will use to connect its plant with the Northern Pacific and with the Puget Sound railways.

**ROADS AND FENCES TO BE BUILT**

FOREST SERVICE WILL EXTEND TRAIL EAST OF PHILIPSBURG—OTHER NOTES.

Supervisor D. G. Kinney of the Missoula national forest, announced yesterday that his men would, during the month of July, complete the Rock creek road, east of Philipsburg, and increase its length so that it will be extended as far north as the Rock Creek ranger station. Part of the road has been reconstructed by the forest service, acting in conjunction with the Granite county officials. During the next month the men of the Missoula forest will construct fence pastures at Seeley lake and at Georgetown lake.
