TIM LEBEAU BEATS HIS HORSE

NEIGHBORS SAY THAT HIS CRUELTY IS RESPONSIBLE FOR DEATH OF THE ANIMAL.

So cruelly did Tim Lebeau beat a horse yesterday and the night before that it became necessary last night for the police to order the animal shot to put it out of its misery. For weeks the treatment of this horse by its owner has been shocking. The horse, a magnificent white animal of the draught class, has been beaten repeatedly in the street and about the barn where it has been kept. The neighbors have been cognizant of this action but it was not until yesterday that they said anything about it.

Friday night neighbors heard the sounds of a disturbance from the Lebeau barn, as if a horse were down and being kicked against the sides of its stall. Soon there was a sound of the door of the barn closing and then the swish of a whip could be heard, time after time. The sound of these blows was continued for a long time and then came a succession of thuds, as if a club had been substituted for the whip. The horse squealed in agony.

Yesterday morning the abused horse was in the yard of the barn, lying helpless and unable to rise. Lebeau had a man annexed during the forenoon and pounded the creature in the apparent endeavor to make it rise. The horse struggled but could not get to its feet. Then the beating was renewed. When the horse became too weak to even make the effort to rise, the man and Lebeau got ropes and tied to the animal; then they dragged the helpless creature, beating it all the while.

Later in the day the attention of the police was called to the case and Chief Vealey ordered the horse killed. Last night the matter was brought to the notice of Mayor Logan and he promised to investigate the case and, if he could find sufficient evidence, to see to it that Lebeau was punished for cruelty to animals.

To Chief Vealey Lebeau said that the horse was old and helpless and that its condition was due to weakness of age. J. M. Kennedy of the state board for the protection of children and animals was in the city yesterday and acted with the chief in having the horse killed.

PLEAD GUILTY TO CHARGE. Matt Muller, Victor Hill and Matt Wall, who were arrested the other night for taking part in a riot at Clinton, were arraigned before Justice & Millin yesterday afternoon on charges of disturbing the peace. The charges of disturbing the peace were not pressed, as he was up against a charge of third degree assault, it being alleged that he had pulled a knife during the fracas. The trio pleaded guilty. Muller and Hill paid \$5 fine each and sentence will be passed on Wall at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

MEN PLEAD NOT GUILTY. W. J. Gavin and Harry Flynn, the two railroad men accused of attempting to drive two girls, Mamie and Agnes Newbauer, up the Rattlesnake a few nights ago, were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Small yesterday. Gavin is charged with third degree assault upon Mamie Newbauer, while his partner is up against it, somewhat worse, in that he is alleged to have stolen a watch from the lunch counter at the depot the same day. Both men pleaded not guilty and will have their trial at 1:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

TO TALK AT DAYTON. Dr. Morton J. Errod left yesterday for Dayton, on the reservation, where he will deliver the oration at the town's celebration of July 4. At Dayton a large crowd is expected, as excursions are to be run from Kallepell and several other points.

Jean Woucon, aged 45, was caught under a falling tree and crushed to death. The accident occurred near St. Joe. The wind blew an old tree over and Woucon was by the roadside, unable to escape.

There is nothing in the situation with which he cannot deal by telegraph. He will leave for the north after meeting the king of Sweden at Sassnitz, July 8, where the two monarchs will inaugurate a new steamship line between Sweden and Germany.
