NEWEST NOTES OF SCIENCE.

A Californian has patented an attachment to be attached to the end of a suit case to carry liquid containers or anything else that would be in danger of injury if placed inside the main receptacle.

Experts of the department of agriculture have succeeded in raising in this country a species of watermelon indigenous to Louisiana.

A new substitute for glass for skylights, greenhouses and other places where glass would be in danger of breakage consists of a coating of a special substance in fused all spread on wire netting.

Experimenters in Mexico with Australian tree cotton have developed two varieties, which may be mixed with wool or silk, respectively, which they so closely resemble as to make detection difficult.

A new British Columbia law prohibits the practice of medicine after January 12, 1912, of any person who can not produce a diploma from a college of medicine which requires at least five years' study.

To encourage forestry the state government of New York during the past season distributed more than 1,000,000 tree seedlings, in many cases sharing the cost of an expert to oversee their planting.

A novel alarm clock invented by two residents of Austria is connected with an electric battery, which gives a sharper shock through electrodes attached to the wrist, at the time for which it is set.

Backed by the Krupps, an extensively capitalized company has been formed in Germany to control the rights for the Wright airplane for that country and its colonies, Sweden, Norway, Denmark and the Turkish Empire.

According to the geological survey, the United States produced 342,570,721 pounds of copper last year, the greatest amount on record exceeding the previous maximum figures, in 1906, by 24,765,309 pounds.

Over the lower portion of its course the Mississippi river apparently runs up hill for the bed of the river at a point 20 miles above New Orleans is 100 feet lower than the level of the Gulf of Mexico.

Australian sugar refineries have solved the problem of disposing of waste molasses by first carbonizing it to a non-fluid consistency and then burning it in their boiler grates.

Plans are under way for the harnessing of the tides of the Petitcodiac river at Amherst, N. S., which are said to waste 3,000,000 horse power a day.

A patent has been granted on a dinner table ornament which contains electric light bulbs supplied by a storage battery contained in its base and a vase for flowers.

According to a discussion before the London Institute of Marine Engineers the day of electric propulsion for ships by motors connected directly to the propeller shaft is near at hand.

Tests by French scientists seem to show that it is a sixth sense that enables bees to return to their hives from as far away as two miles, the insects depending upon neither sight nor smell.
