### RIVER BOAT RENEWS TRAFFIC

#### "BABY ROSE" A NEW STEAMBOAT TO PLY ON MISSOURI RIVER FROM FORT BENTON.

It seems as though the railroads were to have a new rival in the freight business in the near future for within the past few days the steamboat "Baby Rose" will begin operation on the Missouri river between Fort Benton and Bismark with the possibility of extending from the Montana city to St. Louis. The putting of this boat into service would seem to denote that the river traffic is about to be renewed after 20 years of idleness and in case this fact develops the lower freight rates will probably cut into the railroad's trade.

The resumption of river service on the Missouri between the head of navigation at Fort Benton and Missouri river points below on the river will be of general interest to many old-timers who remember the period when that was practically the only means of communication with the outside world, for northern Montana at least, and before the coming of the Northern Pacific for the whole state, it has always been something of a mystery how the great river traffic was so thoroughly killed off by the railroads, when the rates charged for freight on the river transportation were considerably lower than the railroad charged for the same service.

### CUTOFF OPERATIONS STILL SECRET

NO REPORTS COMING FROM LOLO PASS AS YET—OTHER NEWS OF THE N. P.

The matter of the Northern Pacific cut-off over the Lolo pass still remains quite a problem. The attorneys for the road are pushing ahead the different condemnation suits for the road and the surveying parties in the district are continually being augmented. Otherwise all is quiet and there is no sign of action from either side in the great struggle for a right-of-way through the mountains.

Now comes the definite announcement of the plans of a party of Milwaukee commercial men to tour the northwest within the next few weeks. Talk has been rife in the "Brewers' City" since the recent trips of the other business men of the middle west and plans have at last been concerted for a tour through the northwestern country which will put all others in the shade.

There is still no let-up to the remarkable rush to the exposition. Every train, both ways, goes through with two sections and it begins to look as though the whole nation were journeying toward the coast cities. Everyone seems happy too, and relieved from the close, humid air of the big eastern cities, Montana climate seems ideal to the travelers.

It seems as though the washout which tied up the Bitter Root train Tuesday was not the overflow of an irrigating ditch, as was at first reported, but a flood in earnest. Speaking of the occurrence yesterday, County Commissioner Worden, on whose ranch the washout occurred said, "It was no mere overflow which caused the trouble but a real, in earnest, cloudburst. The water came down from the hills in a flood and took out everything in its path. There is a big gully along the track where the washout occurred which is always dry. The water filled this to the top and after the storm we even found that gravel had been deposited by the flood on the sill of a sawmill which stood on the edge of the gully, five feet above its banks. The storm was one of the worst that I have seen in a long while."

Railroad men who were in Paradise during Tuesday's storm also bring reports of a fearful rain. The storm, as was reported at the time, blew down a big three-story hotel there and the men who were in the division point at the time report a great deal of other minor damage. "I never saw such a storm," said one man yesterday. "The rain came down in sheets and the wind was terrific. Trees were blown over and the hotel was smashed to kindling wood. It is a miracle that no one was hurt." Reports from all along the line are the same, and the storm was a general one through the valley.

### SOLD FOR TAXES.

Special to The Daily Missoulian. Wallace, July 7.—At 11 o'clock this morning valuable timber lands of the Milwaukee Land company were sold by the assessor for \$7,440 to settle on delinquent taxes. At 1 o'clock this afternoon there came a telegram from Boise City from the United States circuit court enjoining the sale. As a result of the lateness of the message the county claims a victory over several timber firms which have been fighting to have taxes reduced by a large percentage.

### PUGET SOUND ADDS TO MILEAGE

#### REPORTS OF COMMISSION SHOWS GREAT GAIN—NEWS OF THE DIVISION.

During the past two years Montana has gained 1,008 miles of railroad trackage. This fact is shown by the recent report of R. F. McLaren, secretary of the state railroad commission for the two years ending July 1. Most of this gain is due to the construction of the Puget Sound lines through the state which has added to the total mileage, 633 miles. The remainder can be attributed to the Billings & Northern branch of the Great Northern which has recently been finished. To add to this the Puget Sound is at present engaged in the building of a number of branch roads and the number of them will undoubtedly be increased within the next year. The Northern Pacific is building a cut-off across the Lolo pass and within the next couple of years Montana will begin to rank as a real railroad state. The totals as shown by the secretary's report are as follows:

Goodwin, is expected tomorrow morning from Three Forks to take up his duties here and he will begin at once to get a line on affairs on the division. Mr. Goodwin was Mr. Barrett's chief clerk at Three Forks and was, at his request, assigned to the office here.

General Superintendent H. B. Earling will be a visitor at the local division offices today, being on his way back to Butte from the coast. He will be met at North Fork this morning by Superintendent E. H. Barrett and Chief Engineer W. H. Davison who left here yesterday for that purpose and will be escorted by them over the division. Mr. Earling's visit here will probably be very brief as he is in a hurry to get back to Butte and it is very likely that he will not spend more than a few minutes here on his way through.
