



MISSOULA BALL FANS THOUSANDS OF FANS HOLD ELECTION DISAPPOINTED

NEW OFFICERS OF CLUB ARE CHOSEN AND TWO GAMES ARE SCHEDULED.

The Missoula baseball association was given a formal start last evening by the election of officers and the laying of plans for a series of games. The association met in the office of E. C. Maloney and after a short discussion elected the following officers: C. F. Dorman, president; O. T. Worden, treasurer; J. W. Shroyok, secretary; H. B. Campbell, team manager; E. C. Maloney, counsel; Dan O'Hern, umpire, and James R. Reid, custodian. Everything was reported as being in fine shape, the team becoming one of the fastest in the state, and the grounds are in the finest condition imaginable, and with the set of officers, which was elected last night the path of the new organization looks rosy. Two games have been arranged for next week with the Butte Reduction Works team. The first game will be played next Sunday, July 11, in the afternoon at 2:30, and the second at 6:15 Monday evening.

The Butte team is reported by being a whirlwind and if the home pride carries off the winning end of the score next week they will have to play ball to do it. Captain Marx is putting the men through the mill in fine shape now and the new club will see to it that the practice is kept up so that the locals will go in the game strong. The Missoula team will not be announced until Sunday, but the Reduction Works will probably play as follows:

'FRISCO CLUB POSTS FORFEIT.

San Francisco, July 9.—A forfeit of \$5,000 was posted tonight by the Mission Athletic club of this city with a local paper for a 20-round fight in San Francisco between Stanley Ketchel and Sam Langford. The fight is scheduled for some time during August. Ketchel is to receive \$10,000, win, lose or draw, while Langford is to receive a percentage of the gate receipts. The offer will be submitted to Ketchel either tonight or tomorrow. It developed today that no forfeit has yet been posted by the promoters of the Ketchel-Langford match at Ely, Nev., articles of which were signed last night, and a fight at that place is by no means regarded as a certainty.

CONGRESS ADJOURNS.

Havana, July 9.—The Cuban congress adjourned sine die this evening. Immediately afterward President Gomez left for his summer home. His last act was to sign a decree annulling the contract for the purchase of artillery and rifles for use in the Cuban army made with France and Germany, and appointing General Gerna, commander of the army, and two other officers as a commission to visit the arms factories in the United States and Europe to decide upon the best types and to make new contracts.
