## COUNCIL ELECTS NEW ALDERMAN

JOHN E. MOODY IS APPOINTED UPON RESIGNATION OF H. L. BAYES OF FOURTH.

John E. Moody is now the junior alderman from the fourth ward, succeeding Alderman B Hayes, resigned. This was the most important action which the city council took in a short meeting last night, held chiefly for the purpose of doing away with what little business had accumulated during the last week. Mr. Hayes tendered his resignation last night, stating that he had moved to the Orchard Homes, thus leaving his office vacant and Alderman Jensen at once placed John E. Moody in nomination. No other names were presented and on roll-call Mr. Moody was elected, all five of the aldermen present voting in his favor. Mr. Moody has already held several city offices and, as Mr. Jensen stated last night in placing his name before the council, is probably better fitted for the office of alderman than any other eligible man in the ward. He will hold his new office for the remainder of Mr. Hayes' term which expires two years from May last.

### Minor Matters.

The first part of the meeting last night was taken up with a lot of minor petitions and old matters. The petition of Pat Callahan asking that the liquor license of Douglas Brothers be transferred to him was granted. The petition of John Bonner and others asking for a temporary sidewalk over the excavation for the Cowell-Dixon block was disposed of by the council ordering the street commissioner to see that the ordinance providing for such cases is enforced.

The ordinance providing for the installing of registry books in lodging houses and hotels was given its first reading and referred.

The bond and contract of the Miracle-Tripp Concrete company was read and referred to the streets and alleys committee for judgment under the advisement of the city attorney.

### Petitions.

The petition of the Missoula Gas company asking for a 60-day extension of their franchise was, after a lengthy discussion by the aldermen, referred to the city property committee. In connection with this a petition from the Missoula Belt Line Railway, which is a subsidiary organization under the gas company, asking for the use of certain streets and alleys, was read and referred to the streets and alleys committee.

A petition was read from W. H. Smead, asking for permission to stretch an electric lighted sign across Higgins avenue. It was referred to the special registration committee.

Alderman Corbett's motion that all men who have been in the employ of the city for one year or more be given a two-week vacation was passed by the council, under the provision that the vacation be not taken until after August 5. City Attorney Woody asked for a 30-day leave of absence beginning July 30. His request was granted by the council.

O. B. S. Orr appeared before the council with a proposition to the city to rent some of the streets by competitive bidding. He was referred to the special committee. Mr. Orr's idea is to use the streets for tents to house the registration crowds.

### License Revoked.

Mayor Logan then revoked the license of the only cigar store on West Front street on the grounds that it had become a "secretary" headquarters. The mayor's action was sustained by the council.

The matter of handling the crowd attracted by the various fairs and the crowds about the streets in general was brought up and, as there is no way of doing away with the fairs, the police were ordered to keep the crowds moving during the registration period.

After a short discussion of a few minor matters the council adjourned until July 19.

M. J. Coen, the present manager of the Golden Rule store, is now occupying the residence of Rev. T. A. Wickes on "Forestry" avenue. Mr. and Mrs. Wickes will soon start on a drive across the reservation to visit their daughter, Mrs. Taylor in Kalispell. At present they are at the home of their daughter, Mrs. Hope, on Woodford avenue.

### STORES WRECKED.

Danville, Ill., July 12.—A tornado struck Fithian, near here today, wrecking a number of stores and damaging a large elevator there and also the substitute power station of the Illinois traction system. So far as known no persons were hurt.

## WILL STOP OVER IN MISSOULA

CABINET OFFICERS, SENATORS AND CONGRESSMEN WILL VISIT GARDEN CITY.
