WILL START STEEL LAYING PLANS FOR THE SHOW ARE FORMED

SOUTH ABUTMENT IS FINISHED AND SUPERSTRUCTURE OF BRIDGE WILL BEGIN.

The south abutment of the new Higgins avenue bridge was completed yesterday as far as the steel line, and now all is in readiness for the erection of the steel at that end. Since yesterday morning the men of the McCreary & Millard company, which has the sub-contract for laying the steel, have been engaged in getting the steel ready to put in place. So now the bridge will begin to assume tangible form.

The force of the Burrell Bridge & Construction company will be put to work on the construction of piers Nos. 2 and 3 at the north end of the structure, which had to be abandoned last spring owing to the high water. It is likely that pier No. 3 will be the first one to which attention will be devoted. The company now has five large pumps on the job and it is thought that these will be sufficient to keep down the water in the excavations.

NOT FOR LODGING.

Editor Missoulian:—In fairness to myself and to correct any wrong impressions that may have been given by the published report of the proposition submitted by myself to the city council on date of July 12, 1939, I desire to say I have no interest as to how or where the registration crowds that are here or that may come to Missoula in the near future are housed, as I presume our excellent hotels and rooming houses will properly care for all who come, but as an authorized notary public I am interested in the proper registration of all who desire and can qualify, with the greatest possible dispatch consistent with safety to the interests of the applicant. Many of our notaries have offices upstairs in business blocks; others in the county have no office in Missoula at all, consequently to facilitate business for applicants with limited time and at the same time give all notaries an equal chance I did propose that our city council should offer to the highest bidder for registration purposes only, the triangular piece of ground situated just south of the Northern Pacific railroad station and belonging to the city of Missoula, and a part of Alder street where it intersects with Higgins avenue, which action would no doubt put several hundred dollars in the city treasury, add greatly to the convenience of the registering public and place all notaries who wanted to bid for that location on an equal footing.
