GAS PLANT GROWING RAPIDLY

PRESIDENT SMITH HAS THINGS MOVING TOWARD COMPLETION AT THE WORKS.

Over at the plant of the Missoula Gas company, a big force of workmen is hastening the construction as rapidly as the intricate and complicated nature of the work will permit. With the exception of three curiols—which are on the road—all of the machinery is here and every effort is being made to get the plant ready as early a date as possible. Under the direction of Superintendent Price, who came to the Missoula plant from St. Louis, the benches for the retorts are being constructed. These represent the highest type of masonry work and are models of bricklaying. All of the foundations are finished, and the machinery is being installed rapidly.

The big tank is being riveted together by experts from the east, who have had long experience in gasplant construction. Their foreman says that the concrete foundation at the Missoula plant is, without exception, the best he has ever seen anywhere. It is certainly a model piece of concrete work.

The buildings have been so arranged that the capacity of the plant can be doubled at comparatively small expense. The foundations have been built in some cases for the duplicate machinery and all through the plant, pipes have been laid for the double connection, which it is thought will be built next year. So great is the confidence of President Smith in the future of the city.

Mr. Smith is giving personal attention to every detail of the construction work as it proceeds. His plant will be carefully and thoroughly built. The machinery is up to date and the plant, for its size, will be the equal of anything in the country. The present plan is to lay 12 1/2 miles of mains this year and 25 miles as early as possible next season.

APPLE SHOW STARTS WITH A RUSH

CHARLES F. DORMAN WILL BE THE PRESIDENT OF THE HORTICULTURAL EXHIBITION.

Charles F. Dorman will be the executive head of the Western Montana apple show which is to be held in Missoula October 18 to 22, inclusive. He was the unanimous choice yesterday at a meeting held by the executive committee and the commission named by the county commissioners. Associated with Mr. Dorman in the management of the apple show will be C. L. D. Kellogg, A. L. Stone, M. L. Dean and J. J. Erfert. Mr. Erfert was chosen secretary.

The apple show will be held in the Union theater, which will be equipped with booths and tables for the display of fruit and other farm products. The big hall has been placed at the disposal of the show by Manager Harms at a reasonable figure, and it will be transformed into an exhibition hall by George Clynic and President Dorman.

The dates for the apple show have been selected after conference with the fruitgrowers; it is believed that there will be better apples shown at these dates than would be possible any earlier. The show will be under the direct patronage of the horticultural society of the state, and Ravalli and Missoula counties are already at work in preparation for the event. It is hoped that Sanders and Flathead counties, and perhaps Lincoln county, will come in.

With the plans of the committee carried out as they have been made, the apple show will be a notable event. M. L. Dean, the inspector at large of the state board of horticulture, is a man with wide experience in horticultural shows, and he will co-operate in the preparation of the premium list, which will be announced in a short time.

The work of getting the show started has been given a good impetus and it will be pushed at a lively rate. Mr. Dorman in his management of the Western Montana fair last season gave ample evidence of his ability in this direction, and his associates are lending him all the aid possible. They will appear at once to the orchard men all over western Montana for their assistance in making this the greatest display of fruit ever made in the state.

NOTES OF WALLACE

Wallace, July 14.—Wallace residents who desire a register for the Flathead lands are endeavoring to arrange through Agent Loneragan for a special train service that will allow local people to return the same day they leave here.

The Caledonia mine, located between the Bunker Hill & Sullivan and the Last Chance and adjoining each, is shipping steadily. A nine-foot ore body has been opened up on the 300-foot level carrying high lead values and silver averaging 300 ounces to the ton some of the silver being pure native metal. The mine is shipping steadily. The Bunker Hill & Sullivan and the Last Chance are two of the biggest lead-silver mines in the district.

The Orofino mine at Murray, one of the newest of the lead-silver shippers, is having surveys made for a 300-ton mill to handle the second class ore, of which there is a large body.

An eight-foot vein carrying a foot of gold ore was opened up in the Pilot mine at Murray, the gold averaging \$4,000 in value to the ton of ore. A lower tunnel is being run to ascertain the character of the gold ore at depth, after which reduction works will be built.

SHORTEST RAILROAD IN THE WORLD

MISSOULA BELT LINE ISN'T VERY LONG BUT IT WILL BE BUSY.

What is probably the shortest independent railway line in the world is being built on the south side of the river. It is the Missoula Belt Line railway and it is owned by a regularly incorporated company, organized for the construction and operation of this road, whose length is about 300 feet.

The members of the Missoula Belt Line Railway company are the owners of the Missoula Gas company and the abbreviated road is being built to connect, virtually, the Northern Pacific and Milwaukee railway lines. On the south end the belt line will have a switch connection with the Bitter Root branch of the Northern Pacific. Its north terminus is to be at a Milwaukee switch.

The roadbed has been graded and is ready for the ties; its connection with the trunk lines depends, presumably, upon the traffic arrangements that are made. But the Belt Line railway is there and it will be doing business right soon, from one terminal or the other and, perhaps, from both.

REPORT SUBMITTED ON TARIFF MATTERS

Washington, July 14.—Through Senator La Follette, the bureau of statistics of the department of commerce and labor, has presented to congress an analysis, Mr. La Follette says: "According to the figures supplied by the bureau, the bill as passed by the senate on the basis of the importations of 1907 leaves unchanged the duties on imports of the value of \$450,000,000 or 14.65 per cent. Duties are increased on imports of the value of \$149,716,619 or 2.51 per cent, while the decreases affect imports of the value of \$90,389,675, or 13.84 per cent. The average increase of the entire bill is 5.56 per cent."

Senator La Follette declared that "unless the rates of the bill are greatly reduced in conference the bill should be vetoed."
