NOTED DAMAGE SUIT IS DISMISSED

COMPROMISE IS MADE BY MRS. McDONALD WITH RAILROAD—COURT HAPPENINGS.

A damage suit that has attracted considerable attention and has been hard fought in the district court came to an end yesterday when, on motion of Woody & Woody, attorneys for the plaintiff, the case of Mary Alice McDonald et al. against the Northern Pacific Railway company was dismissed as settled. The suit was for \$40,000 and it is announced that the compromise brought \$5,500 to Mrs. McDonald, who was suing to recover for the death of her husband.

The story of how David R. McDonald met his death is still fresh in the minds of Missoula people, for the dead man had many friends and came to his death in a manner strikingly horrible. He was serving as assistant trainmaster and, on January 21, 1907, was up on the Coeur d'Alene branch clearing the tracks from snow. After "backing" drifts farther up the line the engine was returning and, while crossing bridge No. 46, just above De Burgis, the engine left the rails and fell into the St. Regis river.

McDonald was badly crushed and scalded and was so caught under the engine, as it lay in the river, that he could not be extricated. In the icy water he remained from 11:45 in the morning until 7 o'clock that night, by which time his body was reported by a Missoula physician while the man was still in the water, but even this heroic means failed to save his life. He left a widow and several minor children.

Decree of Divorce.
In the district court yesterday Jennie Friend was granted a decree of divorce from Victor Friend. Both are residents of Missoula.

Petition is Filed.
County Attorney Shumway yesterday filed a petition in the district court asking that Fred, Susie, Joseph, Michael and John Rank be adjudged dependent children and committed to the state orphan asylum. The petition will be heard today.

Suits Dismissed.
Two suits brought by Barbara E. Higgins against George and Ronald Higgins and against George Higgins, were dismissed as settled.

The adoption of Marguerite Weinstein by Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Tuott was legalized in the district court yesterday afternoon.

Commissioners' Report.
The commission in the condemnation proceedings brought by the Clearwater Short Line Railway company against William E. Spicer and Sarah Spicer made a report to the district court yesterday afternoon. The value of the land the new road desires is fixed as \$1,200, while the damage award is \$350, a total of \$1,550. The commissioners in this case were C. E. Dorman, James Corbett and J. P. Nagle.

DR. M. J. ELROD STARTS FOR SUMMER WORK

Professor Morton J. Elrod of the University of Montana left yesterday afternoon for the school's biological station on Flathead lake. This is the 11th season that research has been conducted at the laboratory on the lake and due to the fruit of experience and careful preparation, promises to be one of the most successful. Before leaving yesterday Dr. Elrod said that he thought this year's work would be of great importance, and that an unusually large number of students, scientists and laymen would spend the summer on the reservation.

LETTER FROM DAUGHTER.

Yesterday's edition of this paper told of the holding of John J. Ward to the district court on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. The item printed yesterday stated that the incident that led to Ward's arrest happened two years ago, and that he had left the city soon after and had not returned. Yesterday a communication was received by The Missoulian from a daughter of the accused man, in which it was stated that he had been summoned by telegram to British Columbia on the occasion of his first leaving town, that he had returned once during the first year and seven times during the one following. The Missoulian's statement was according to the complaint filed in the case.
